

COUNCIL MEETING JANUARY 8, 1969

The regular meeting of the Isle of Palms City Council was held in the Council Chambers of City Hall this day convening at 8 PM EST.

The Meeting was opened with a Prayer by the Honorable Joseph H. Hamer.

Members in attendance were: The Honorable Joseph H. Hamer, Mayor, B. G. Lee, Mayor Pro-Tem, Aldermen James E. Boswell, M. V. Capper, D. E. Mahaffey, Stuart Preston and W. L. Shaffer, Jr. Members not in attendance Aldermen L. C. Cable and C. J. Sahlmann.

The minutes of the regular Council Meeting of December 11, 1968 were approved as written.

Mayor Hamer read the following correspondence, which had been received since the last council meeting.

Letter from Dr. R. Ramsey Mellette, 811 Carolina, Re: Horses being kept by his neighbors. Mayor Hamer said he would contact Dr. Mellette.

Letter from Municipal Association, Re: Business License Ordinance for Insurance Companies dated December 16, 1968. This letter was referred to Alderman Stuart Preston for study and recommendation.

Alderman Shaffer moved that the Property belonging to the Eastminister Presbyterian Church of Columbia, S. C. be Nulla Bonna as set forth in information received from the County Auditor. Seconded Alderman Lee. Approved.

Alderman B. G. Lee asked the Mayor to add some members to the Playground Commission for the year 1969. Alderman Lee and Mayor Hamer will have the names at the next council meeting.

The City attorney was discussed.

Mayor Hamer informed the Council that we now have a full time temporary Policeman, Mr. Henry Cox.

Alderman Shaffer reviewed the Budget for the year 1969. Alderman Capper moved that the sanitation salaries be increased from the proposed \$22,516.00 to \$23,764.00, which will allow a 10 cent per hour increase to the sanitation workers. Seconded Alderman Stuart Preston. Motion carried. Mayor Hamer stated that he voted against the raise and would like his vote so recorded.

Alderman Capper advised the council that Mr. W. M. Connelley was no longer on the City payroll. He stated he would advise Mr. Connelley of this action.

Mayor Hamer moved that the budget as amended be adopted for the year 1969. Seconded Alderman Lee. Approved.

There being no further business the meeting was so adjourned.

In checking into delinquent and escaped license taxes due a number of South Carolina Municipalities, it has come to our attention that in the majority of our cities the ordinance levying license taxes upon insurance companies is not broad enough to cover all operations of various insurance companies, or is not in compliance with the Code of Laws of South Carolina as amended in 1961.

We have therefore drafted a sample ordinance which we feel would cover the different insurance operations in a municipality and would require all companies either having an agent in the City, or receiving premiums from risks located in the City written through other than local agents, to pay the license tax. This is in accordance with the State Law as amended, which in connection with fire insurance companies states in part "Preference shall be given hereunder to the municipality wherein the insured property is located." The ordinance also covers premiums collected in the City on property located elsewhere on which no tax is paid to another municipality.

Under the majority of ordinances now in effect which we have studied, companies receiving premiums from risks located in the City, not collected in the City or received by an agent in the City, are not liable for municipal tax to the City in which the risk is located. A number of companies operating in the State of South Carolina do not have local agents or collect the premiums in the City, even though they receive a considerable amount of premiums from risks located in the majority of the South Carolina Municipalities.

You will note the enclosed sample ordinance requires that the tax be payable January 1st of each year based on premiums received during the preceding calendar year. Inasmuch as the majority of insurance companies allocate premium income by municipality on a calendar year basis, we believe this due date would insure a more accurate accounting of premium income for taxation. This would not affect the license year for other businesses in your City.

We believe if your City will adopt an ordinance which will in effect contain the requirements of the enclosed sample ordinance, it will increase the revenue for your City from this source and equalize the tax burden for all companies receiving premiums from risks located in your City. We therefore suggest that you refer this information and the enclosed sample ordinance to your City Council at their next meeting for their consideration. We would like to point out that the enclosed sample ordinance is offered as a guide for your City Council and should be adapted to your local situation.

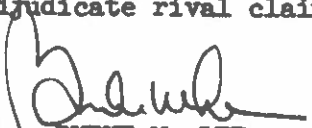

SPECIAL COUNCIL MEETING FEBRUARY 4, 1969

A Special Call Meeting of the Isle of Palms City Council was held in the Council Chambers of City Hall this day convening at 3 PM EST.

The meeting was opened with a Prayer by the Honorable Joseph H. Hamer, Mayor.

Members in attendance were The Honorable Joseph H. Hamer, Mayor. Aldermen J. E. Boswell, L. C. Cable, M. V. Capper, B. G. Lee, D. E. Mahaffey, Stuart Preston, C. J. Sahlmann and W. L. Shaffer.

The minutes of the regular Council meeting of January 8, 1969 were approved as written.

Mayor Hamer stated that he had called this meeting because he is scheduled to go into the hospital, Monday February 3, 1969. He said he would be in the hospital for about a month and there is certain pressing business that needs councils immediate attention.

There are some appointments that must be made: To be Mayor Pro Tempore for 1969 - W. L. Shaffer. To be City Attorney-Michael J. Burkett. Reappointments, Chief of Police-J. Blair White, Fire Chief-W. M. Connelley, Clerk-Treasurer-L. H. Smith, Jr., Recorder-S. E. Wallerstedt, Building Inspector-H. C. Schad. Playground Director-K. C. Carroll. All Committees are to remain the same unless altered by council. Approved.

Mayor Hamer then advised the Council that he had been in touch with the State Highway Department and that they had resolved the minor difficulties that they had encountered in getting the paving of the area known as the Martschink Tract. However, the paving of the Front Beach area is still in difficulty. The problem is that the Highway needs an easement to drain rainwater into the ocean. At present they are unable to get these easements. If they cannot get the easements they are going to have to drain the water into the marsh on the north side of the island. The cost is very high. Request your authority to tell the Highway Department to delete that part of Waterway Boulevard above 32nd Avenue that is necessary in order that the Front Beach project can be completed and comply with the budget limitations.

Alderman Cable made a motion that in order that all work on the Martschink Tract can be completed that the city purchase the necessary pipe to drain an area at the end of Dunes Boulevard. The cost not to exceed \$200.00. Seconded Alderman Boswell. Approved. Alderman Stuart Preston abstained from the voting.

The following correspondence was read to council for their information and action if required:

Copy of letter from Honorable C. M. Dangerfield January 30, 1969 to Mr. J. C. Long, Re: US Route 17 and By-Pass. (Copy attached).

Public Notice, Department, Department of the Army, District Engineers, Jan 28, 1969. Re: Permit to construct a pier on Hamlin Creek. (as info Attached).

Mayor Hamer, informed the Council that he had received three bids for construction of a new City Hall. They were as follows: Hugh Ford Construction Company \$15,250.00 Rivers Construction Company \$15,600.00 and A. S. Bishop Builders \$16,200.00.

Alderman Shaffer stated that he had been asked by several people just why a new City Hall, when the Playground Building was in much worst shape. Mr. Lee stated that he had talked with Mr. Kirby and that he should have the plans and bids for a Playground Building within 60 days. Alderman Shaffer asked if anyone had thought of what it is going to cost to put the present City Hall building into livable shape for the Firemen?

Alderman Cable made the motion that Alderman Shaffer be authorized to let the contract for the New City Hall based on the bids which were previously quoted. Provided the title has been received for this property. Seconded Alderman Sahlmann. Approved.

Alderman Cable asked Council if a Bond Issue is required, do we have to go to the Legislative Delegation to get approval?

Alderman Shaffer asked, what is the status of the Codification of our Ordinances with the Michie Company? Mayor Hamer stated that the Michie Company was still awaiting the City Attorney to visit their offices in Virginia.

Alderman Cable made the motion that the Chairman of the Playground Commission investigate the procedure necessary for borrowing the money for the construction of the Playground Building. Seconded Alderman Shaffer. Approved. Mayor Hamer asked Mr. Lee to also be sure that the deed transferring the property to the city was complete.

Alderman Lee stated that he had some changes he would like to make to his Playground Committee. He would like to delete the following: Mr. Gordon Brock, Mrs. Iris Landrum and Mr. Robert Prado. He requested that the following persons be added: Mr. Max Fore, Mr. George Cash, Mr. James Mills, Mrs. Anne Moye and Mrs. Lucille White. He requested that letters be mailed to each new member. Moved by Alderman Sahlmann. Seconded Alderman Cable. Approved.

Alderman Lee asked the Mayor to send a letter to the Playground Auxiliary thanking them for their time and money they has so graciously contributed to the Playground.

Mayor Hamer stated that there had been an investigation of the Horse complaint on Carolina Boulevard and that no action was recommended at this time.

Alderman Shaffer requested that there be an Executive Session of Council to discuss Rules & Regulations for City Employees. He asked the status of the Police Cruiser? There has not been a meeting so this is still pending. What is the status of the old police cruiser? Presently at James Oldsmobile.

Alderman Cable asked that a four way stop sign be erected at the corner of Twenty-fourth Avenue and Hartnett Boulevard. The congestion around the Baptist Church warrants this type of traffic control.

Alderman Preston asked Alderman Capper just how the burning of our Dumpt will be affected by this law on not burning Dumps in Charleston County. Alderman Capper stated he had contacted the Honorable Clyde Dangerfield and he had not received an answer.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING FEBRUARY 19, 1969

The regular meeting of the Isle of Palms City Council was held in the Council Chambers of City Hall this day convening at 8 PM, EST.

The meeting was opened with a Prayer by the Honorable Walter L. Shaffer, Jr. Mayor Pro-Tempore.

Members in attendance were: Mayor Pro-Tempore W. L. Shaffer, Jr. Aldermen L. Clay Cable, Max V. Capper, Billy G. Lee, Stuart Preston, and C. J. Sahlmann. Absent: Mayor J. H. Hamer, Aldermen J. E. Boswell and D. E. Mahaffey.

The minutes of the Special Council Meeting of February 2, 1969, were approved as written.

There was a discussion of the obtaining of easements for the S. C. Highway Department, for drainage in connection with the road project presently underway on Ocean Blvd. Mr. Shaffer reported that the Honorable Clyde M. Dangerfield had informed him that without easements from the Beach Co., that it would be necessary for the City to pay approximately \$1,200.00, for drainage pipe to complete this project.

Mayor Pro-Tem Shaffer read a copy of a letter from Mr J. C. Long to the S.C. Highway Department. Re: Condemnation of Beach Front property for drainage easement. Mr. Wallace Burgis, as a representative of the Merchants operating on the Front Beach, said that his group would be willing to pay the \$1,200.00 for drainage pipe to complete the project. This matter was referred to the Ways & Means Committee as to how to collect and disperse the funds.

Mr. Stellige from Mt Pleasant, S. C., representing interested citizens in aiding the Moultrie High School Band, attend a music festiabile in Florida, asked the council if the city could contribute to this worthwhile project. Alderman Capper made a motion that the City contribute \$100.00 for this project. Seconded Alderman B. G. Lee. Motion carried.

Mayor Pro-Tem Shaffer read a letter from the Board of Township Commissioners, for Sullivan's Island, S. C. to the Honorable L. Mendel Rivers, February 5, 1969, Re: Moving of the Tide Forecasting Section of the Charleston Weather Bureau to Columbia, S. C. (Copy attached). The Council voted to endorse the letter.

The plans and specifications for the purposed City Hall were reviewed and discussed. The bids received were discussed and reviewed. Alderman Capper made a motion that the Council approve the bid submitted by Mr Hugh Ford, for the sum of \$12,250.00. Seconded Alderman Lee. Approved.

The Report of Audit, December 31, 1968, submitted by Edward H. Baker, Certified Public Accountant, Charleston, S. C. was reviewed by Council. Payment of the bill for the above report was approved.

Mayor Pro-Tem Shaffer, asked Alderman Stuart Preston to assume the Chairmanship of the Ways & Means Committee and investigate Auditing Cost.

Alderman Lee reported that he had discussed the procedures of Having a bond issue to finance a new Playground Building, with our Attorney Mr. Burkett. As Mr. Burkett was out of town at the present, Mr C. S. Way Jr. was at the meeting to assist the Council. After discussing the Bond Issue, it was decided that additional study is necessary before finalizing this project.

MEETING FEBRUARY 19, 1969, Continued

The attorney for the Beach Company, (Mr C. S. Way Jr) stated at the meeting that the Beach Company would deed the Playground property to the City for one dollar when the city is ready to accept the property.

Alderman Lee made a motion that the salary of the Playground Director be raised to \$50.00 per week. Seconded Alderman Capper. Approved.

Alderman Lee stated that the Fire Department would be accepting applications for Firemen in the very near future. He stated he is also working out plans to fix the present City Hall to house the firemen.

Alderman Preston reported that the City Attorney's associate would be going to Virginia within the next two weeks and would report back to Council prior to giving the Michie Company the final approval for Codifying the City Ordinances.

Alderman Capper requested authority to place a drink dispensing machine in the Fire Department. Mr Parrish will attend to this machine and be incharge of this project. Seconded Alderman Preston. Approved.

Alderman Capper requested that a bank balance statement be included in all future financial reports.

Mayor Pro-Tem Shaffer discussed the need of council to act on authorizing the issuing of a Tax Anticipation Note, to defray expenses until we can get our tax notices. He stated that it might be necessary to borrow \$20,000.00. Alderman Capper moved that the City be authorized to negotiate for a \$10,000.00 Tax Anticipation Note at this time. Seconded Alderman Lee. Approved.

The Ways & Means Committee was instructed to investigate the license fees of Construction companies with home offices within the City Limits.

Council was informed that Insurance Companies License fees collections werewell below that collected last year. Council agreed that the City should enter into an agreement with the SC Municipal Association for assistance in collecting license fees from insurance companies.

Alderman Cable, as Chairman of Streets & Lights is to attend the CHATS meeting and report at the next meeting.

The correspondence on the City Clerks Association was referred to the Ways & Means Committee for action.

Mayor Pro-Tem Shaffer asked for committee reports on the Code for City Employees. There were no reports ready. Mr Shaffer stated he would ask for reports at the next Council meeting.

Police vehicles were discussed. No report was available.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING MARCH 19, 1969

The regular meeting of the Isle of Palms City Council was held in the Council Chambers of City Hall this day convening at 8 P.M. EST.

The meeting was opened with a Prayer by the Honorable Joseph H. Hamer, Mayor. Mayor Hamer requested that Alderman W. L. Shaffer, Mayor Pro-Tempore preside as he was not physically well enough to preside and would have to be excused before all business was concluded.

Members in attendance were Mayor J. H. Hamer, Aldermen W. L. Shaffer, J. E. Boswell, L. C. Cable, M. V. Capper, B. G. Lee, Stuart Preston and C. J. Sahlmann. Absent: Alderman D. E. Mahaffey.

Mayor Pro-Tem Shaffer introduced three guest, Mrs. J. H. Cutchin, Mr. Julius Wannamaker, and Dr. R. Ramsey Mellette, Jr., who appear before council with reference to a neighbors keeping horses within the city. The City Attorney Mr. Michael Burkett stated that the city's ordinance just requires that the horses be kept in a sanitary stable. However the city could ask the County Board of Health to investigate and determine if this keeping of horses is a health hazard, a menace to health or a nuisance. Dr. Mellett asked if the city had an ordinance precluding the use of barb wire within the city? None exist.

Alderman Preston made a motion that the city request the County Health Department to make inspection to determine if the keeping of horses within this residential area constitutes a health hazard and/or a menace. Seconded Alderman B. G. Lee. Approved. Alderman Shaffer stated that if the County Health Department is unable to solve this problem then we will pursue the City Ordinance. He asked the Chairman of Engrossed Bills to study this matter and work out something that could eliminate the recurrence of this problem.

Mr. Shaffer then asked Alderman Capper as Chairman of this Sanitation Committee to introduce his guest. Mr. Capper introduced Mr. Davies and Mr. Santeres who are associated with the Mobile Chemical Corp. They then explained the advantages of using plastics bags for garbage collection. They presented two concepts. After the presentation, Mr. Capper stated he would like for these two men to make a time study of our problem and see if it would be advantage for this municipality to adopt one of their proposed plans.

Alderman L. C. Cable made a motion that the city authorizes this survey of between 40 to 65 homes at a cost not to exceed \$200.00 to determine the feasibility and adaptability to this municipality. Second Alderman Capper. Motion carried.

Attorney Charles S. Way, Jr. gave the Council a description of his visit with Michie City Publications Company Inc. He stated that they were ready to go to press with our Ordinance but that he was in the process of reviewing this and would go over this with the City Clerk to make sure they were all up to date before final printing. The tentative date for this printing is May 15, 1969. He stated that he had a bill for \$1,000.00 that was due the Michie Publication Co. as per our agreement.

Mr. Way then said he would discuss our Playground Program. He stated that according to law the city could not issue Bonds. However, the city could get a petition of 50% of the freeholders to petition that the city hold an election to authorize a Bond referendum, then hold an election and a majority of the voters approve. We could then get a bond issue. The limit of the time to carry these bonds is 25 years and at the present Tax free bonds are bringing about 6% interest. It would cost the

city about \$2400.00 to get all the administrative work done to issue the bonds. He suggested the city set a ten year redeemable period for these bonds. Mr. Way was of the opinion that it would not be a problem to sell the bonds.

Alderman B. G. Lee stated that he had had a meeting of the Board of Firemasters and they had recommended that the city employ a full time Chief of Fire Department. He would be responsible for training and operations of all fireman and volunteer fireman. He said they were investigating the program the Navy has for employing personnel about to be released from the service. He stated he hoped to have a full time fire department in operation by August 1, 1969. He further stated that he anticipates no increase in his budget for this department.

Alderman Preston asked council if they desired the ordinance dealing with horses to be rigid or to outlaw them. It was the consensus of opinion that horses should not be allowed within the municipality.

Alderman Boswell advised the Council that Patrolman H. L. Cox had resigned from the Police force for personal reasons. The commission had agreed to hire, Mr. John S. Robinson to replace Mr. Cox. His salary will be \$110.00 per week.

Alderman Boswell stated that the Old Police Cruiser had been sold for \$500.00. The new Crash Wagon is in and being readied for use. Alderman Lee moved that the City sell the old Crash Wagon. Seconded Alderman Preston. Alderman Cable request the motion be amended to add: "and advise council of the price offered before final sale". Motion carried.

Alderman Capper stated his committee is exploring a couple of sites for land fill operation. His committee has recommended that the city purchase a chevrolet truck for picking up trash at a cost of about \$3237.64. Alderman Cable moved that the Chevrolet be purchased. Seconded Alderman Lee. Approved. As this was not a budgeted item for the year 1969 it is approved to get the money from the general fund.

Alderman Cable asked about the status of the old Fire Engine. Alderman Lee advised Mr. Cable that it was being repaired and should be back in operation within a week.

Alderman Cable asked what had happen to the Spare Generator in the rear of City Hall. He stated that the radiator plus other parts were missing. The Clerk explained as best he could what had happened to all the parts of the generator.

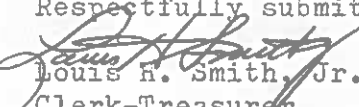
Alderman Cable requested authorization to request a street light at 51st Avenue. Seconded Alderman Lee. Approved.

Alderman Shaffer appointed the Chairman of the Police Commission, the Chairman of the Sanitation Committee and the Chairman of the Beach Patrol Committee as members of the Anti-Litter Committee.

The minutes of the meeting of February 19, 1969 should be corrected to change that part of paragraph nine as reads: "the bid submitted by Hugh Ford, Jr. for the sum of \$12,250.00". Should read "the bid submitted by Hugh Ford for the sum of \$15,250.00". There being no other omissions or corrections the minutes were approved as written.

There being no further business at this time, the meeting was adjourned.

Horses On Island Cause Complaints

The Isle of Palms City Council heard complaints last night from a group of Isle of Palms residents who claim horses are a health hazard and a nuisance in their community.

One resident claimed she "could not sit on her porch anymore because of flies, which were drawn by a nearby horse stable." Other residents also voiced their complaints.

The council agreed to request the Charleston County Health Department to make an inspection of the community's "horse population." The council will make a decision on the horse situation after the health department submits its report.

The Isle of Palms currently has an ordinance which states that a "stable cannot be within 20 feet of a lot line." However, the council felt the ordinance does not cover the present situation. In the event the county

health department does not offer a solution, the council agreed to "pursue the city ordinance" to come up with a solution concerning the horse problem.

The general consensus of the council was that the horses should be prohibited from the island in the future, and ordinances should be passed concerning the "care and sanitation" of the horses now on the island. However, the consensus was not an official motion or vote.

The council also discussed a bond issue program to pay for a new playground for the community. The details of the program will be worked out by the council's attorney.

The council also discussed hiring of a full-time fire chief and an assistant by Aug. 1. Alderman Billy G. Lee said the council did not anticipate an increase in the budget if the personnel are hired.

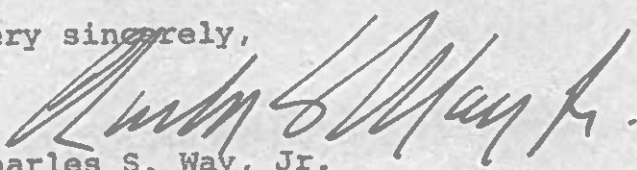

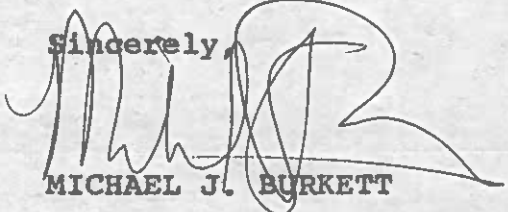

I visited Charleston and Isle of Palms on February 22, 1969. Find that the concern expressed in my letter to you of February 10, 1969 was caused by the fairly common situation of too many names for one job. The plant in question is covered by Pollution Control Authority Permit to Construct #1260, issued to the Forest Trails Development.

I visited the waste treatment plant and found that it looked very good except for the problem of leaks in the tank. They should have been corrected by the time you read this.

It is important to remember that the State Shellfish Patrol reports that there is a leased oyster bed near the point of discharge of the plant into the Intracoastal Waterway. Operation of the system and chlorination of the plant effluent must be very careful and consistent in order to avoid interruption of use of the oyster bed.

We will keep in touch with Mr. Conyers and do what we can to help him get top performance from this plant.

The Department's Engineer and I have surveyed the area at Tenth and Fourteenth Streets on the Isle of Palms as requested by you. Our Engineer has talked with Highway Department officials to determine the design of the drains proposed for installation.

Mr. Weeks, District Construction Engineer for the Highway Department, describes the proposed drain outfalls as being identical to those found at Myrtle Beach, South Carolina. He states there have been no complaints about them.

The drain outfall would be located above the high water mark and would have a bed of rock beneath and extending beyond the opening to prevent washing. There would be some rock around the pipe to anchor it but none that would block the drain outfall.

Based on all information available to us, we do not believe the proposal involves a situation that will pose any threat to the public health. If the streets are not cleaned properly and at frequent intervals, there could be some washing of trash through the drain onto the beach area, but this would be more a matter of aesthetics than of health.

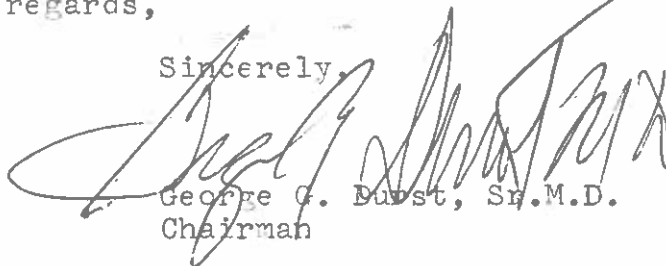

The Sullivan's Island Township Commission has asked that I write you concerning the proposed moving of the tide forecasting section of the Charleston Weather Bureau to Columbia, South Carolina. It appears most unrealistic to us to have this service moved from the tidewater section of our state to an area some 100 miles from the coastal area.

The people living in the low country are vitally affected by accurate forecasting for it affects shipbuilding and the movement of ships, both naval and commercial. The fishing industries, the recreation and tourist industries are also affected; furthermore, all too often our very lives are dependent upon accurate and up to the minute information and warnings for in periods of storm it is well known that tides can be very capricious and sudden in their changed effects. Surely the most reliable information at such times can only come from direct personal observations by people highly trained and of long experience.

This area has been very fortunate and well served for many years by having excellent forecasting by trained and experienced individuals. Surely, it does not seem appropriate to "blindfold" this service by moving it away from the Tidelands.

One has only a short memory who could forget the dramatic and tragic accident when a ship struck the Cooper River Bridge and knocked out a portion of the bridge causing a loss of five lives and untold inconvenience and financial loss to the community. The sudden surging of the ship into the bridge was reported to have come from the tide and wind changes that came about during a local squall.

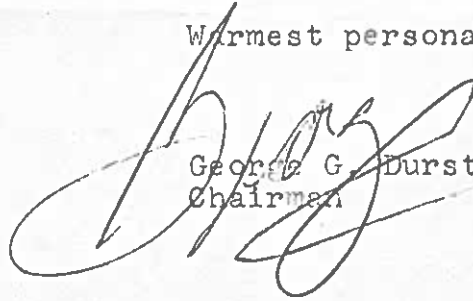

This happened in 1945 when the war effort had crippled the local tide forecasting services.

Financial loss caused by having only one of our naval or commercial vessels run aground would far outweigh any supposed savings that might be thought possible by moving this service.

Dear J. C.:

I am quite disturbed about your letter of January 20, 1969, of which you state that you cannot give the Highway Department easement for the drainage of the business area on the Isle of Palms. If you will recall back during Mayor S. V. Sottile's administration, I tried to get this business area improved under the Primary Road System and I was unable to do so.

In 1966 on our Farm to Market Program, I was able to get the Delegation to go along with me to use Farm to Market funds to improve this area. As you know, under the Farm to Market Law, no funds can be expended for the purchase of right of ways or easements for drainage. I am sure you are familiar with this law and I need not elaborate because I believe this Farm to Market Program was instigated when you were Senator.

Unless we are able to get the necessary easement to take care of the drainage of this area, this project will have to be abandoned. You mentioned in your letter about piping the drain back to the back creek. This, I am told, is out of the question, because the project has already cost more than we anticipated. Due to the high cost of all of our road programs, we have already over expended our 1968 allocation of funds and there will not be anybmore money until 1, July, 1969.

I discussed with Dr. Jacobs, the County Health Officer, the type of drain that the Highway Department plans to install and also what he thought the effect would be of dumping this water on the ocean site as compared to the back beach. He plans to visit this site shortly after the first of February and give me a report on this.

1. I know that you recognize that I appreciate your efforts in having the streets paved and the curbings installed.
2. The Highway Department in connection with the paving and curbing of the streets wanted to run a rather peculiar type of drain from Ocean Blvd. out onto the front beach area. One drain would have been at Tenth Avenue and the other at Fourteenth Avenue. I suggested to Mr. Reed of the Highway Department who contacted me, that he run the drain to the back creek and advised that I would be agreeable to

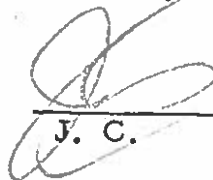

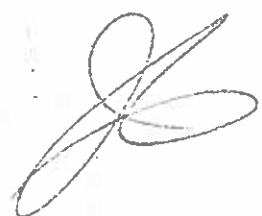

MONTHLY REPORTS

Monthly reports published by the Department of activities for the month December 1968 are submitted under separate cover. These reports are for the information of the Commission.

It is recommended that the Commission accept the December 1968 reports.

CENTRALIZED TRAFFIC CONTROL SYSTEM - CHARLESTON COUNTY

The Commission at its meetings of September 19, 1968 and October 17, 1968 programmed \$275,000 from the State Secondary "C" and State Primary/Urban Construction Programs for installation of centralized traffic control signals in the City of Charleston. This total signal system is estimated to cost \$550,000, with the City of Charleston and the Highway Department dividing the cost on a 50-50 basis.

The City of Charleston will contract with a signal company for signal systems equipment and some of the installation work. The remainder of the installation work will be done by the Highway Department and the City of Charleston. After the signal system is completed, it will be operated at the expense of the City. The title to the signal equipment will reside in the City.

It is recommended that the Commission approve the action of the Department in entering into an agreement with the City of Charleston to carry out the above project.

IMPLEMENTATION AND ENFORCEMENT OF THE 1967 MOTOR VEHICLE INSPECTION ACT

Section 3: Any vehicle which is subject to inspection in this State and which does not display a valid certificate of inspection issued on or before the date as established by the schedule stated herein will be in violation of the Law.

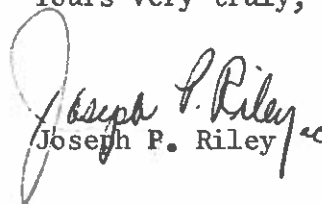
Dear Mayor Hamer:

Dear Joe:

Immediately after talking with you, I got with Ed Latimer, Assistant Attorney General assigned to Wildlife, and we looked up the statute regarding the placing of crab pots. Unfortunately, we find that the statute does not prohibit the placing of these pots, except that they cannot be placed so as to be left dry at low water, nor can they be placed within 100 yards of boat landings and ramps and in the Chechessee River area.

I am sending a copy of this letter to Dr. G. Robert Lunz, Director of Commercial Fisheries, South Carolina Wildlife Resources Department, 2025 Maybank Highway, Charleston, South Carolina, and requesting Dr. Lunz to make recommendations regarding the prohibition of placing traps in waterways which are extensively used.

As soon as I have Dr. Lunz's recommendations, I will present same to the Agriculture Committee of the House of Representatives and the Fish, Game and Forestry Committee of the Senate. It is not anticipated that we will have any difficulty with this matter.

It would seem to me, although I have not investigated the United States Statutes, that the Coast Guard will have jurisdiction in the inland or intra-state waterway and that a situation such as that which you found yesterday would be a violation of the United States Statute. Apparently, it is not a violation of a South Carolina statute and our Conservation Officers would, therefore, not have jurisdiction.

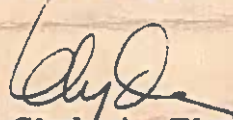

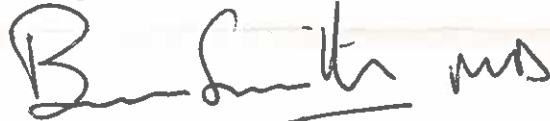
Sir:

According to the request of the City Council, Isle of Palms, I examined the horse pen at the rear of the house at 809 Carolina Ave., Isle of Palms, at 1:30 p.m. Jan. 11, 1969. Officer H. Cox accompanied me.

The temperature was 48 degrees Fahrenheit and the wind 10-15 mph from the North. The enclosure contained one horse and a stall in the NE corner. The pen was fenced with barbed wire, and had been raked recently. Six areas of the enclosure were examined where the horse excreta appeared most profuse. Diggings were made in these areas through the excreta to the soil level. The greatest depth of excreta was 4 inches. No fly larva were seen. Under the above conditions of wind and temperature, I judged the odor within the pen to be inoffensive. No collections of horse excreta were seen outside the enclosure. The horse did not appear diseased.

During this inspection I found no evidence to show that this animal is a public nuisance. It is probable that this horse could be both offensive and a minor health hazard during warmer weather. I will reevaluate the situation in the future if you so wish.

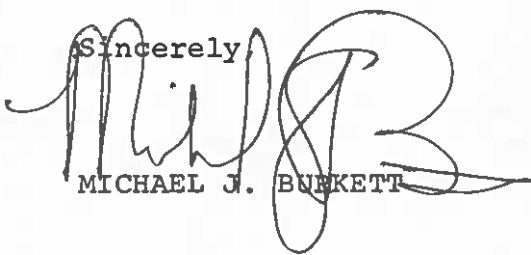

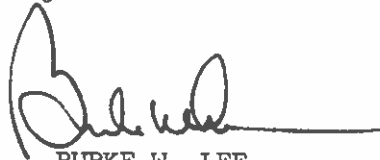

REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING APRIL 9, 1969

The regular meeting of the Isle of Palms City Council was held in the Council Chambers of City Hall this day convening at 8 PM EST.

The meeting was opened with a Prayer by the Honorable Joseph H. Hamer, Mayor.

Members in attendance were Mayor J. H. Hamer, Aldermen W. L. Shaffer, Stuart Preston, C. J. Sahlmann and D. E. Mahaffey. Absent: Aldermen J. E. Boswell, L. C. Cable, B. G. Lee and M. V. Capper.

Visitors attending Council Meeting were Mrs. Nancy Misroon, Miss Linda Emas and Mr. C. P. Emas.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as written.

Mayor Hamer read the following letters that was received since the last meeting: Copy of letter from Michael J. Burkett to Mr. Owens, The Worth Agency dtd 3-27-69, Re: Toporek vs J. S. White. Copy attached. Letter from Mr. Albert Cedel to Mayor J. H. Hamer Re: Mark Cedel 4-2-69. Attached. Copy of Letter from Robert S. Hills, Director Public Works Dept, County of Charleston, to Mr. D. E. Ludington concerning drainage easement in his back yard. Attached.

Alderman Stuart Preston introduced an Ordinance "To Regulate the Keeping of Horses on Isle of Palms". The first reading of this Ordinance was read at Council Meeting and referred to the Engrossed Bills Committee for further action. Copy attached.

Alderman Shaffer made a motion to give thanks for the time Alderman Preston spent in making up the Ordinance regulating the Keeping of Horses on the Isle of Palms.

Alderman Shaffer requested the press to give us some publicity on this subject.

Attorney Burkett said he had not had a report from Dr. Jacobs of the County Health Department, on Mrs. Misroon keeping of horses on her lot.

Mayor Hamer asked Alderman Mahaffey to call a meeting of his Committee, along with his committee, he wanted Mr. Louis Smith, Attorney Burkett, Building Inspector Harry Schad and Mr. S. H. Kirby to settle some discrepancies about Laco Construction Company not getting building permits. Request also for floor plans when the plans are changed.

Alderman Shaffer requested the Clerk-Treasurer write second letters to all unlicensed firms with a dead line to pay Business License Tax.

Alderman Shaffer ask Council if Alderman Stuart Preston would include an amendment to the Business License Ordinance to provide that; no license will be issued until all taxes due the City have been paid.

Alderman Shaffer express that the breakdown of budget, disbursement, and receipts that the Clerk-Treasurer sent out for the month of March, was excellent. Alderman Mahaffey second the appreciation.

Mayor Hamer said he had talked to Mr. Burgis and Mr. Burgis knew a man who would operate the Amusement Park, on the front beach. Mr. Burgis felt that by it being closed has hurt their business. He suggested if a Special License Fee could be issued that they might be willing to try to open the Amusement Park. Mayor Hamer turned this over to Ways and Means for study.

There was some discussion on landful for the Sanitation. Mayor Hamer said Mr. Parrish and Alderman Capper located a place at the East end of the island, but will have to see Mr. Long to see if this is available for city use.

Attorney Burkett said he had heard from Dr. Leonard, County Health Officer and he could not find any larva on the grounds where the horses are kept.

Alderman Shaffer reported that Sullivan's Island is getting a Playground Director from Clemson College and that the County is paying his salary. He said all we had to do was to ask for it. This was referred to Alderman Lee, Playground Commissioner.

There was a discussion of the Bond issue for funds for the new Playground Building.

Alderman Sahlmann made a motion that Chief of Police find out who carries the Insurance for False Arrest. Seconded Alderman Shaffer. Motion carried.

Attorney Burkett reviewed the case of Torporek versus Jimmy White. The City Council of Isle of Palms voted to back Jimmy S. White all the way. The legal fees may run between \$250.00 to \$500.00 but the Council is in hopes that Sullivan's Island will pay half of this bill.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

Dear Sir:

On April 1, 1969 my son, Mark Codel, appeared before Capt. S. E. Wallerstedt to plead guilty to a moving traffic violation. Before fining Mark, Capt. Wallerstedt reprimanded him about the delivery of newspapers. I feel this is a matter involving the customers, the newspaper office and my sons responsible for the particular edition. As parents, we appreciate the official reprimand concerning the accident but I feel the detailed criticism with respect to newspaper delivery was entirely out of order.

In any court, a realist judges the criminal not the crime: for Mark, this was a first offense. The family generally has been a credit to the Isle of Palms. Specifically the two eldest boys, teenagers, are self-employed and outstanding musicians. Both boys in delivering papers have had to move physically both children and toys directly in the path of traffic.

Furthermore, the officials of a small community seek to mold a closely-knit neighborhood. Airing one's grievances in public, especially when irrelevant, serves no purpose. As young as Mark is, he felt that Capt. Wallerstedt had no authority to scold him (or David who was not present to defend himself) about the newspaper delivery at this time. Had this action been outside the court room, it would have been accepted in good grace.

This letter is not written in anger. Before taking this formal action, I spoke with Mayer Hamer who recommended that this incident be brought to his attention. I trust that my criticism will be considered constructive.

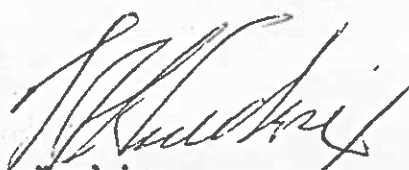

AN ORDINANCE

TO REGULATE THE KEEPING OF HORSES ON ISLE OF PALMS: TO ESTABLISH MINIMUM STANDARDS OF BUILDINGS AND THE HOUSING OF HORSES AND LIKE ANIMALS; TO ESTABLISH HOUSEKEEPING STANDARDS FOR SAID ANIMALS; TO PRESCRIBE CERTAIN REQUIREMENTS FOR THE SAFETY OF CITIZENS WITH RESPECT TO HORSES ON PUBLIC AREAS OF THE CITY AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE ENFORCEMENT THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Councilmen of the City of Isle of Palms in Council duly assembled:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to keep any horse in the City unless said horse is quartered in an appropriate stable and corral located at no point nearer than sixty (60') feet from any dwelling of neighboring property owners. It shall be unlawful to keep any horse on any vacant lot in the City or on any lot in the City other than that designated on the license issued for that horse except as herein provided. Where more than one contiguous lot or lots immediately adjacent across the street from each other are owned by the same person; who shall be a resident of Isle of Palms; and are used together by said owner for said residential purposes or in conjunction with the residential use of one of said lots; said lots shall be regarded together as a single lot so that the presence of a residence on one of said lots shall prevent the other lot so in combination from being "vacant" for the purposes of this Ordinance and said combination of lots shall be regarded as a single lot for the purpose of determining application of the graduated license for the keeping of horses on said island.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to keep any horse in the City unless such person shall provide quarters for the keeping of such horse in the proper or suitable barn or stable. Said barn or stable for horses shall be roofed, enclosed, shall conform to the standards of strength and wind resistance of the Southern Building Code and shall provide accommodations meeting the special requirements for horses recommended in Table 1. Attached.

Corrals or open enclosures are permitted but do not constitute an alternative

for the barn or stable herein required for the keeping of horses. No part of any barn, stable or corral shall be closer than sixty (60') feet to the dwelling house of neighboring property owners nor shall any corral be nearer to any property line than (5') feet, but, where more than one lot is used in conjunction with the enjoyment of a residence, lines separating said lots from each other shall be disregarded in the application of this requirement. All structures for the keeping of horses on the Island which do not comply with the requirements herein shall be made to comply herewith or shall be removed from lots on Isle of Palms within one (1) year from the adoption of this Act.

Section 3. Keeping horses and requiring permits for the keeping thereof.

It shall be unlawful for any person to keep any horse in the City limits unless such person shall keep such horse in a proper and suitable house or stable, kept constantly clean and free from dirt, and if any horse shall be kept otherwise than is herein provided for, or if the house or stable shall at any time be found otherwise than clean and free from dirt and manure accumulations, the owner or keeper of such horse shall be punished as provided in Section 9.

It shall also be unlawful for any person to own, keep or harbor a horse within the limits of the City without a written permit from the Clerk-Treasurer for the keeping of said horse.

Section 4. Horses with contagious or infectious diseases.

It shall be unlawful for any person to bring or keep within the corporate limits of the City any horse having any contagious or infectious disease. The owner, agent or any other person in charge of the horse so affected, or who may have knowledge of such a horse, shall forthwith report the same to the Chief of Police, together with the name of such owner and the place where the horse is kept, and it shall be disposed of under the direction of the Chief of Police.

Section 5. It shall be a condition to the issuance of permits required by law for the keeping of horses on the Island that a showing by the applicant that the horse will be lawfully kept and housed as herein required. An inspection by the City Health Officer shall be made prior to issuance of license to the applicant to

ascertain compliance with said ordinance. No permit shall be issued to any person who is not a resident or a property owner of Isle of Palms, provided that any person living on the Island under arrangement for the rental of property thereon for at least one (1) month shall be deemed a resident of the Island.

Section 6. The term "horse" as used in this Ordinance shall include a horse, a mare, a gelding, a jack, a jenny, a mule, a pony, a burro and other similar quadrupeds

Section 7. It shall be unlawful to ride or drive a horse or other like animal in the streets or other public areas of the City unless the following safety standards are observed:

- (1) Any such horse or other animal shall be equipped with a bridle and saddle or reins and harness adequate for maintaining full control of said horse.
- (2) It shall be unlawful for any person to ride or drive any horse or other like animal upon any of the sidewalks of the City.
- (3) Pedestrians shall always have the right of way over horses in all areas.
- (4) No horse or other like animal shall be ridden or driven so as to be out of control or so as to threaten the safety of persons on foot.

The violation of this Section of this Ordinance shall, in addition to other punishment elsewhere provided, subject to offender to a fine of Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars for the first offense hereunder and the suspension of the permit for the possession of such horse on the second offense.

Section 8. It is hereby declared unlawful to ride or drive a horse, pony or other similar animals on the beaches of the City of Isle of Palms or any of the approaches thereto.

Section 9. Violation of any provision of this Ordinance shall subject the violator

to imprisonment for a term of not exceeding thirty (30) days or to a fine of not more than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars for each offense, and each day during which any violation shall persist or be permitted shall be considered a separate offense.

Section 10. The City Clerk shall annually issue upon application, written permits as required in Section 3, upon the payment of the following graduated fee based upon the number of horses quartered, stabled or kept on a lot:

\$25.00 for first (1st) horse

\$50.00 for second (2nd) horse

\$100.00 for third (3rd) horse

\$200.00 for fourth (4th) horse

\$300.00 for each horse over four(4) on a lot

It shall be the duty of the Chief of Police to seize all horses for which permits have not been issued whether at large or not and compound them.

Section 11. In the event any owner, agent of the owner, lessee, occupant or person shall violate any provision of this Ordinance and shall fail within twenty (20) days from the date of conviction under this Article to remedy, by removing animals or buildings or by correcting conditions, any matter herein declared to be unlawful, The city by its lawful representatives or appointees or any of them, shall forthwith enter the premises on which said unlawful matters are located and shall remove all buildings, animals and other offending conditions therefrom. The clerk of the City shall thereupon make out a statement of expense incurred in making such removal and shall place the same on file and shall assess the costs shown thereon against the owner of such lot to pay such costs as assessed with ten (10) days from notification, the same shall become a lien on such lot to be collected in a pre-empt manner the same as taxes are collected by Clerk-Treasurer. Any animal found on the island in violation of this law shall be impounded by the City until payment by the owner of such fine or fines as shall have been assessed against him together with all expenses

for keeping such animal or animals; provided, that if the same be not paid within ten (10) days, such animal so taken shall be sold at public outcry, after notice of the time and place of such sale having first been given by advertisement in a paper having general circulation in the County of Charleston, South Carolina, at least seven days prior to said sale. Said notice having been posted for the space of at least one week, at City Hall. The proceeds of such sale shall be applied to the payment of such fine and all costs and expenses connected with the keeping of such animal or animals impounded as aforesaid and for advertising the sale of the same and the balance, if any, shall be paid over to the owner.

Section 12. If any part or parts of this Ordinance shall be held to be unconstitutional, said unconstitutionality shall not affect the validity of the remaining parts of this Ordinance.

Section 13. The Health Officer of the City shall also enforce the rules & regulations of the State Boards of Health concerning keeping of horses and if anything in this Ordinance conflicts with these rules then State rules will apply.

Section 14. Any Ordinance or Ordinances or parts of Ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 15. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon ratifications.

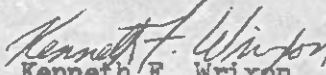
Dear Mr. Hamer,

REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING MAY 1., 1969

The regular meeting of the Isle of Palms City Council was held in the Council Chambers of City Hall this day convening at 8 P.M. EDT.

The meeting was opened with a Prayer by the Honorable Joseph H. Hamer, Mayor.

Members in attendance were Mayor J. H. Hamer, Aldermen L. C. Cable, M. V. Capper, B. G. Lee, D. E. Mahaffey, Stuart Preston, C. J. Sahlmann and W. L. Shaffer, and Attorney C. S. Way, Jr.

Mayor Hamer read a copy of a letter he had written to the Honorable J. Mitchell Graham, Chairman County Council dated April 24, 1969; Re: Policy of furnishing pipes for drainage. He then read Mr. Graham's reply dated April 28, 1969.

Mayor Hamer read a copy of a letter from the Honorable Clyde M. Dangerfield to Mr. J. C. Long dated April 23, 1969. Thanking Mr. Long for granting easements for the Highway Department. Copy attached.

Mayor Hamer stated that Mr. Thomas, who operates the Isle of Palms Fishing Pier had given him the dimensions and the wording for signs to be placed near the fishing pier to designate the pier as a No Surfing Area.

Mayor Hamer read a letter from Mr. David L. Phillips, 3302 Hartnett Blvd.; Re: Clearing Lots 13 & 14 Block Q. He also read a letter from Mr. Richard A. Scalise, 803 Palm Blvd; Re: Clearing of Lots 1, 7, 8, 14 and 15, Block 8 Section A. The Mayor asked the Clerk to have the lots cleared.

Mayor Hamer read a letter from Mr. George P. Chaconas, Chairman of the Board of Adjustments and Appeals, dated April 24, 1969; Re: Appeal of Mrs. Kate Lubelsky request for variance of the Zoning Ordinance. The Board recommendation was the appeal be granted. Council approved the findings of the Board.

Mayor Hamer read the letter he received from Mr. Kenneth F. Wrixon, Chairman Isle of Palms Playground Commission dated May 5, 1969; Re: Conditions of Playground Building. He informed Council that he had asked Mr. W. M. Connelly, Chief of Isle of Palms Fire Department and Mr. Harry Schad Building Inspector to inspect the building as requested by Mr. Wrixon. The Mayor then read the report on the Playground Recreation Building dated May 7, 1969 and a copy of the letter he sent to Mr. Wrixon with reference to the Inspection letter.

Mayor Hamer then read a letter from Mr. Kenneth F. Wrixon, Chairman of Isle of Palms Playground Commission, with reference to unsafe conditions of five light poles located on the Playground. The Mayor asked Alderman Lee to investigate this matter and report back to council his findings.

Council approved the expenditures of \$17.50 for advertisement in Moultrie High School Annual for 1970.

Mayor Hamer presented a Bid for Furniture for the New City Hall from Charleston Office Supply Company in the amount of \$2,075.55. (Attached). Alderman L. C. Cable moved that the City accept the bid. Seconded Alderman Capper. Motion carried.

Mayor Hamer advised Council that the old Police vehicle is still up for sale. He stated that he had found a Police Cruiser in New Jersey that normally sells for \$4,900.00, that he can get for the city for \$3,125.00, but that we will have to

send someone to New Jersey to drive it back to the Isle of Palms. The Mayor further stated that the city will get \$2,500.00 from the Insurance Company in settlement for the wrecked Cruiser. Alderman Cable made a motion that the City take immediate action to purchase the Police Vehicle located in New Jersey. Seconded Alderman Lee. Approved.

Mayor Hamer stated that he had been given an estimated price of about \$30,000.00 for a Steel Building for the Playground.

Mr. C. S. Way, Jr. stated that if council would like he would look into the possibility of getting someone to build a suitable Playground Building and lease it back to the city on a 20 year lease. He stated it would take about a week to get an answer on this type of a project. Mayor Hamer asked Mr. Way to investigate this matter and let him know as soon as possible, if this could be done.

Alderman Shaffer reviewed the Finance report for the month of April.

Alderman M. V. Capper read a proposed ordinance with reference to clearing of lots on the Isle of Palms without a person having to make a written complaint from the adjacent property owners. Mr. Capper also requested that council dispense with the rules and approve this ordinance. After a short discussion period, Mayor Hamer said he would refer this proposed ordinance to the Engrossed Bills Committee. After further discussion on the proposed ordinance. Alderman Capper asked that his proposed ordinance be withdrawn.

Alderman Capper read a Resolution (Copy attached) that he would like the Council to pass. Alderman Cable moved that the Resolution be adopted. Seconded Alderman Capper. Approved.

Alderman Preston read the Second Reading of the Ordinance "To Regulate the Keeping of Horses on Isle of Palms. To established minimum standards of building and the housing of horses and like animals; To established housekeeping standards for said animals; To prescribe certain requirements for the safety of citizens with respect to horses on public areas of the city and to provide for the enforcement thereof." After reading the Ordinance in full, Alderman Mahaffey moved that Section 8 of the Ordinance that reads "It is hereby declared unlawful to ride or drive a horse, pony or other similar animal on the beaches of the City of Isle of Palms or any of the approaches thereof," be amended to read "It is hereby declared unlawful to ride or drive a horse, pony or other similar animal on the beaches of the City of Isle of Palms or any of the approaches thereof during the Period May 15 to October 15.

Alderman Shaffer made the motion that Rules be suspended to allow the third reading of the aforementioned ordinance. Seconded Alderman Mahaffey. Approved.

Alderman Preston conducted the third reading of the ordinance "To regulate the Keeping of Horses on the Isle of Palms. To established minimum standards of building and the housing of horses and like animals; To establishing housekeeping standards for said animals; To prescribe certain requirements for the safety of citizens with respect to horses on public areas of the city and to provide for the enforcement thereof".

Upon completion of the Third Reading of the above Ordinance. Alderman Lee moved that the Ordinance be approved. Seconded Alderman Sahlmann. Approved.

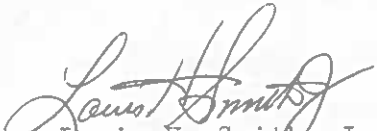

And that they be asked to erect appropriate warning signs at all exits from Palm Boulevard and any other notification that may be necessary to make the public, particularly young visitors to our city, aware of this new speed limit.

Dear Bobby:

I have discussed a problem peculiar to the East Cooper Area with the governing officials of our three municipalities of Mount Pleasant, Sullivan's Island and the Isle of Palms, and I believe this letter reflects the wishes of all of them. I am sending each of them a copy for their information, with the hope that they will individually express themselves to the Legislative Delegation.

Due to the geographical location of the East Cooper Area, it is neither served by as heavy a concentration of County Police as other populated areas of Charleston County nor is help from outside as readily available. In addition, Sullivan's Island and the Isle of Palms are major resort areas with the usual large fluctuations in population. All of this has engendered a spirit of close cooperation between these various communities over the years and has fostered the development of an arrangement whereby the police officers of each of the communities have "filled in" for the police officer of another community during temporary periods of absence and during other similar situations or during emergencies. In order to permit this extra-territorial exercise of police functions beyond the municipal confines of the municipality of which the police officer is an employee, each of the police officers has been commissioned a deputy sheriff, so that he could act as deputy sheriff while operating under this arrangement beyond the confines of his municipality.

Recently, this arrangement was challenged and its legality questioned, the claim being made that deputy sheriffs have only extra-territorial power for the service of civil process and not for arrests, etc.

The three communities involved want to perpetuate the arrangement on some legal basis and request that our Legislative Delegation prepare and introduce legislation to effect this purpose. Since the dual office-holding prohibition of the Constitution prohibits a man from being a police officer of more than one municipality, perhaps a special public service district having police protection as its sole

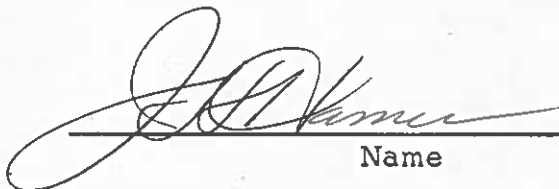

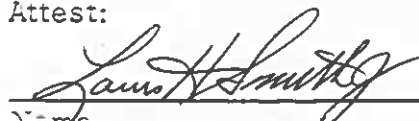

Dear Joe:

I don't necessarily consider letter writing to be my forte but I use this means to better convey my thoughts and feelings after having given a matter considerable thought. I hope these thoughts are to no avail.

The indecision on a new playground building still disturbs me as I'm sure it does everyone else who has the slightest connection with it. We on council should be more disturbed because of the fact that it is our responsibility to allocate necessary money or to see that this money is brought about by the proper method. Before we lose track of the fact let's be reminded that this money is not ours but belongs to all the taxpayers. This is why our state constitution says that before obligating any governmental agency like ours for a long period of time there must be a referendum.

Now, I believe that any controlling body can and will compromise their obligations from time to time, to an extent. But, how far does this extent go? Personally, I believe we could do this for perhaps a couple of years for anything that is absolutely, and without question, necessary. Beyond this we had better not go.

You know, Joe, whether a large amount of money was borrowed directly or a twenty year lease was signed, as was suggested, amounts to precisely the same thing. And to see some of us jump on this band wagon is not understood by me. Undoubtedly it is a desperation move in order to get something started. It is also a devious means to circumvent the will of the people.

Let me point out a few observations on the couple of plans so far proposed for this building and then I'd like to also point out a couple cost figures.

The plan that includes the basketball court with minimum dimensions for a junior high age court could be used for absolutely nothing except to have ten boys play basketball. Now, looking at the number of baseball teams presently at play it is easy to see that there could be twice this number of basketball teams. I'm wondering where, while games are going on, will

all the other children be and what facilities will be available for such other games as ping-pong, movies, dancing, or skating. It looks like there would of a necessity be perhaps one night a week set aside for the various activities. For a certainty, this building would not be adequate.

To make this plan practical I believe there must be the following adjustments and additions:

1. At least twelve additional feet must be provided on at least one side of the court for spectators, aside from the fact that three feet between court and wall is not enough room for safety sake. There would be a lot of bruised heads.
2. Rest rooms must be at least twice the size to accomodate more "johns" and hand wash sinks and to provide room for the youngsters to move around.
3. The storage room needs to be much larger, perhaps two or three times larger.
4. The kitchen needs to be larger in order to be practical for use during any large function.
5. In order for the whole building to be operational and versatile there needs to be another addition of at least forty feet by forty. This would provide area for movies, games, and other activities while basketball is being played.

With these things adjusted lets look at what would be required. Instead of the 5140 square feet as outlined it would approximate 9000 square feet, perhaps larger. Lets take the lowest suggested price per square foot of \$8.00. This amounts to \$72,000.00. By the time any furnishings and equipment are added it could easily come to 75 or 80 thousand.

By using a \$75,000.00 figure at a conventional loan rate of probably 8% for a period of twenty years lets see what it would cost. About \$620.00 per month, \$7,440.00 a year, and \$148,800.00 for the twenty year period. In an arrangement to lease a building this would jump to closer to \$9,500.00 per year and \$190,000.00 for the twenty years. All for the use of \$75,000.00. Rember, that with an operation like this your operational budget will be about twice what it is now. You can readily see that there could be \$20,000.00 or more a year put into our playground. I personally would not be opposed to this if it were brought about in the proper manner.

Lets look at another approach. There is no question about this way taking longer time but on the other hand it will take care of an immediate need and set a sounder goal financially. It will also provide an incentive with anxiety and an appreciation of what can and will be done. And the biggest "besides" is that present facilities would be expanded to a thousand per cent better status right now.

Using a figure in the \$25,000.00 to \$30,000.00 bracket, a building could be erected very soon through the use of tax anticipation notes for a period of a couple years at a cost which in comparison would amaze anyone. Using our tax money as it comes in this summer the building could be paid for in cash when completed. Perhaps early next year a tax anticipation note would be negotiated for about \$20,000.00 and when tax money comes in next summer this could be paid off. The same procedure the following year for about \$10,000.00. During this two year period we'd have paid less than \$1,200.00 interest and the building would be paid for.

After this is accomplished a second building or adjoining building large enough to accomodate a bigger and better basketball court could be erected in the same manner. By comparison, during the course of getting the two buildings not more than \$2,500.00 to \$3,000.00 in interest would be required against \$115,000.00 if an adequate building were leased for twenty years. This would amount to about a four and one-half mill tax levy down the drain for a period of twenty years.

All for the sake of wanting everything right now. What is wrong in waiting about two years in order to get the ultimate in recreational facilities? I'm sure most of us do this in our personal affairs.

Joe, I know that some people will respond to this proposal with the thought that I and others have no regards for the welfare and concern of our Island youngsters. This would be extremely far from the truth so it would bother me not one iota.

And, Joe, believe me there is nothing personal in this matter as far as I am concerned except to see that we do the right thing and to give the playground folks that which is desperately needed and wanted in the quickest possible time.

Gentlemen:

We invite your attention to a wastewater treatment plant operator training program which is presently being set up in two areas of South Carolina. The S. C. Pollution Control Authority has been awarded a contract by the U.S. Department of Labor, Manpower Administration, providing for a forty-four week training course for eighty wastewater treatment plant operators; forty in the Greenville area and forty in the Sumter area.

The course will consist of classroom work which will be handled by the Greenville and Sumter Technical Education Centers, and on-the-job training which will be conducted by an instructor who will travel to each waste treatment plant. The classroom time will consist of one full week in the TEC center to start, and one day per week thereafter for the duration of the course. An on-the-job instructor will work with the trainee at his own waste treatment plant for a total of 70 hours during the remaining forty-three weeks.

This training will be offered at no cost to the trainee other than travel expenses to and from the TEC center. All books, instructional materials and supplies will be furnished. There will be no cost to the employer other than necessary time away from the job.

As you may have heard, the Public Water Treatment Plant Operators Law has been amended by this session of the legislature to include the mandatory certification of wastewater treatment plant operators. In other words, after January 1, 1971, it shall be unlawful for any person to operate a wastewater treatment plant (sewage or industrial) unless the operator holds a valid certificate of registration issued by the South Carolina Board of Certification of Public Water and Wastewater Treatment Plant Operators. This training will assist these men in qualifying for certification, as well as providing them with the knowledge and skill necessary to properly operate and maintain their waste treatment system.

Once an applicant has been determined eligible for this training, the South Carolina State Employment Service will assist in completing enrollment criteria called for by the Department of Labor in its contract.

We plan to start in Greenville around the middle of July and in Sumter around August 1st. As you can see, time is short. If you would like to enroll for this training, or if you have men under whom you would like to send, please let me know by return mail and I will contact you personally with complete information.

This is a fine opportunity and I urge you to give this matter careful consideration.

I would like to advise that I have contacted several investors who are usually interested in this type of transaction, but I have been unable to locate anyone interested in this particular transaction.

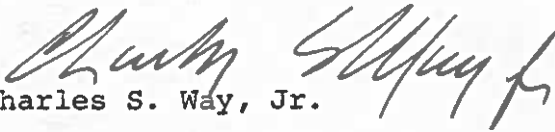
They advise that the interest rate has gone so high that they would not be interested in such a transaction at this time.

REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING JUNE 11, 1969

The regular meeting of the Isle of Palms City Council was held in the Council Chambers of City Hall this day convening at 8:15 P.M. EDT.

The meeting was opened with a Prayer by the Honorable Joseph H. Hamer, Mayor.

Members in attendance were Mayor Joseph H. Hamer, Aldermen L. C. Cable, M. V. Capper, B. G. Lee and W. L. Shaffer.

The minutes of the last regular council meeting of May 14, 1969 were approved as written.

Alderman M. V. Capper requested that his letter to Mayor Hamer in January 1969; Re: "Bond issue for Playground Building", be made a part of the minutes of the January Meeting.

Alderman B. G. Lee informed the Council that the Playground Auxiliary is now getting the property owners to sign the petition for the Bond issue. He further stated that there were no new developments concerning the Playground Building since the Special Meeting.

Alderman W. L. Shaffer asked council for their opinion on getting some younger people for the Volunteer Fire Department. He stated that almost all of those joining the Volunteer Fire Department in the past two years were over 40 years of age. Alderman Shaffer asked what was the status on getting facilities for paid firemen. Alderman Lee said all depended on when the Administrative Section moved into the new city hall. He said it should not take more than 90 days to have the facilities ready to house firemen once the administrative section is moved.

Alderman L. C. Cable stated that he is asking the S. C. Electric and Gas Company to place street lights on Dunes Boulevard and on 25th Avenue between Waterway Boulevard and the Inland Waterway.

Alderman W. L. Shaffer reviewed the Income and Expense Report for the month of May.

Alderman M. V. Capper requested that a Special Meeting of Council be held in Council Chambers, Wednesday June 18th, 1969 at 8 P.M. The purpose of this meeting is to discuss the new garbage dump, pick-up procedures, the use of bags, etc. He informed council that the new ditch landfill was used today for the first time. The cost for this operation is not known at this time. He stated that he had ordered 400 more bags to extend the pilot project. There seem to be some minor objections to this project but indications are that it has been successful.

Mr. Capper called to the Council's attention, The Flyer that was published during the past political campaign titled "Pay as you go Government". He pointed out that some projects are being pushed for political expediency. Plans proposed for the city at present will not give the city its monies worth over the long run according to what he has been told. He stated that the citizens should be informed of all phases of the plans and finances before they are asked to approve a project of this type. Mr. Capper stated that under the Financing Plan and a Building Plan to allow better utilization of the building for all activities was presented to council then he would offer the voters an alternative plan.

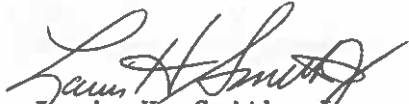

A Special Call Meeting of the Isle of Palms City Council was held in the Council Chambers of the new city hall this day convening at 8 P.M. EDT.

The meeting was opened with a Prayer by the Honorable Joseph H. Hamer, Mayor.

Members in attendance were The Honorable Joseph H. Hamer, Mayor, Aldermen L. C. Cable, M. V. Capper, B. G. Lee, D. E. Mahaffey, Stuart Preston, C. J. Sahlmann, and W. L. Shaffer, Jr. There were eleven visitors at this meeting.

The Mayor explained to Council that this meeting was called for the purpose of deciding a course of action to pursue with regards to a new playground building. He requested that other business not relevant to this matter be held in abeyance until the regular meeting.

Mr. S. H. Kirby, the Architect, explained the drawing he had of the Playground Building to the Council. He stated the cost would be between \$50,000 to \$60,000.

Mayor Hamer then said the floor was open for discussion. Alderman Capper said he thought that we were going too great an expense for one Sport (Basketball). Alderman Lee explained how the building would be utilized. Mayor Hamer stated that he thought council should be concerned with the building and the Playground Commission should govern the action and use of the building.

Alderman L. C. Cable stated that he wish to make the following motion "The City should move forward by asking the Freeholders to sign a petition to hold a Bond issue election and if enough names are obtained hold the election as soon as possible. Seconded Alderman B. G. Lee. Approved.

Dear John:

Pursuant to our conversation on Monday and your letter of June 27, we have investigated Clyde Dangerfield's recommendation for a new connection to extend from about the middle of the Isle of Palms to US 17 near Secondary Road 97. Using zone to zone movements from CHATS, it looks as if the largest average daily traffic we could expect on this crossing in 1985 would be about 2,600.

With a forecast 1985 volume of no more than 2,600, it would be extremely difficult to justify the investment required from conventional highway funds. Coincidentally, in reviewing a preliminary draft of the Coastal Plains transportation plan, I noticed that the consultant has recommended such a connection. Adoption of this recommendation and funding of the Coastal Plains Highway Program would, of course, brighten the picture considerably.

I discussed with Bill Bradley the traffic problem at the intersection of SC 703 and Jasper Boulevard in Sullivan's Island. Bill feels (and I am inclined to agree) that possibly the most practical solution would be to construct a bypass between SC 703 (northwest of Raven Street) and Jasper Boulevard in the vicinity of 30th Street.

Enclosed is a copy of Mr. Hendrix's letter of August 22, 1967 (with its enclosure) outlining what seems to be a reasonably feasible solution to serve until the new bypass could be constructed and to continue to be useful after that time. As far as I know, Sullivan's Island has not yet accepted this recommendation.

In accordance with a request from the Honorable Clyde H. Dargatzis, our Traffic and Planning Section has recently completed a traffic investigation at the subject location. The purpose of this investigation was to determine a means of alleviating the traffic congestion occurring on the east approach of Jasper Boulevard during the summer lunch season.

This is a right angled intersection with Jasper Boulevard, entering from the east and west, presently controlled by stop signs. S. C. Route 703 makes a 90 degree turn at this intersection as it follows the north leg of 22nd Street and the east leg of Jasper Boulevard. The stop control on the east approach of Jasper Boulevard is presently supplemented by a flashing red light installed over the "Stop" sign. During the summer, when the problem is the greatest, this intersection is used extensively by beach traffic following Route 703.

Attached for your consideration is a copy of Mr. Dargatzis's letter and a traffic signal drawing prepared by us. If the parking adjacent to the intersection can be prohibited to effect two lanes

on both approaches of Route 703, a signal sequence operation can be provided which will greatly favor the majority of traffic using this intersection. This type control would benefit the overall operation and capacity of this intersection.

Could you investigate the feasibility of effecting the "No Parking Any Time" zones shown on the attached drawing and advise me of your findings? If you and the Board of Township Commissioners for Sullivan's Island concur with our recommendations, the Department will take all the necessary steps to procure and effect the signal installation, providing the Town of Sullivan's Island assumes the electric current cost for the operation of the signals.

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING

IN RE: DOCKET NO. 14,747 - Proposed Changes in Tariffs of Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company Covering Charges for Intrastate Toll Telephone Service.

The South Carolina Public Service Commission has received a petition from Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company requesting approval of proposed changes in its Tariffs covering charges for Intrastate Toll Telephone Service.

The petition states that the effect of the proposed schedule of toll rates is to change the procedure for rounding off the charge for additional minutes of toll time used after the initial minimum period. If the charge for an additional minute after the initial period constitutes a fraction of a nickel, such charge under the present tariff is rounded to the next lowest nickel. The proposed change would be to round off charges for additional minutes to the next lowest penny. This procedure would result in the charge for additional minutes being more precisely stated as a correct percentage of the initial period charge.

The petition states that, historically, the procedure of rounding to the next lowest nickel made for more convenient and practicable bookkeeping and billing; however, with computerization it is now no more difficult to round the toll charge to the next lowest penny than it is to round to the next lowest nickel.

The petition further states that the proposed schedule will produce estimated additional gross annual revenues of \$657,000 for the Company, which amount after applicable income taxes will net the Company approximately \$288,000. This amount will, to a small degree, help to offset the pressures of increased expenses, taxes, and heavy construction expenditures at prevailing high cost levels.

A public hearing in the above entitled matter will be held in the Commission's office, 704 Owen Building, 1321 Lady Street, Columbia, S. C., on Wednesday, September 3, 1969, at 10:00 A.M., at which time all interested parties will be given an opportunity to be heard.

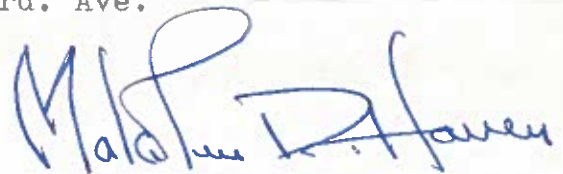

Dear Mr. Smith: As you may know I own a home on the beach front on 53rd. Ave. Back last spring when we had a severe storm a large amount of sand was washed up on 53rd. Ave., and it is now impossible for us to use our front drive-way-- something we'd like to do especially since when friends come to visit us we don't have room for them to park in our rear drive. I feel that all that is necessary would be for a scraper to make about five "passes" and push the sand back up against the break-water and our drive would be cleared. Also it would stop cars from driving onto the beach there (yesterday-Sunday--three cars received tickets for being on the beach.)

I thought that those streets in that locality were state maintained but was told by Mr. McNeal of the Highway Dept. to get in touch with the County. In talking with Mr. W.G.Mazyck of the County Public Works Dept. he suggested that I make a formal request to you and that you in turn could get in touch with him (747-7335) and it was my impression that he might be in a position to be of help in clearing the road of sand. Anything that you can do along such lines would be greatly appreciated. REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING JULY 9, 1969

The regular meeting of the Isle of Palms City Council was held in the Council Chambers of City Hall this day convening at 8 P.M. EDT.

The meeting was opened with a Prayer by the Honorable Joseph H. Hamer, Mayor.

Members in attendance were Mayor Joseph H. Hamer, Aldermen J. E. Boswell, Max V. Capper, B. G. Lee, Stuart Preston, D. E. Mahaffey, C. J. Sahlmann and W. L. Shaffer, Jr. Others present Attorney M. J. Burkett and Mr. W. G. Walter.

The minutes of the last regular Council meeting of June 11, 1969, were approved as written.

Mayor Hamer read a letter from The Honorable Clyde M. Dangerfield, Member of Charleston Legislative Delegation to Honorable Silas N. Pearman, Chief Highway Commission, State Highway Dept. July 8, 1969; Re: Funds Allocated for Beach Erosion. (Copy Attached).

Mayor Hamer read "An Act to Authorize the County Council of Charleston County to Establish a County Dog Pound for Quarantine Purposes and Employ necessary Personnel; To Prohibit owners from allowing Dogs to run loose in Charleston County, and provide a penalty for violation".

Mayor read a letter from D. O. Winter, M. D. June 11, 1969; Re: Horses on Island. Mayor Hamer stated that Chief White should investigate this complaint.

Mayor Hamer read letter from S. C. State Highway Dept., June 19, 1969 - Charleston Traffic. (Attached).

Mayor Hamer stated that the parking of private automobiles on the island was creating a very serious problem. Visitors are parking without regard to the rights of others. He stated he would like for council to erect No Parking sign to control this problem. Also, to properly enforce this we would need additional Police for the week-end. After much discussion this matter was referred to the Police Commission for action. It was suggested that the County Police be asked to give us some assistance on the week-ends.

Mayor Hamer stated that although the implementation of Garbage Bags & Racks had been decided at a previous special meeting, he desired to reopen the subject in an effort to determine if there was some other course that could be followed to possibly improve the sanitation service within this municipality. The questions to consider are: Should it be mandatory? Should the city give the bags to the citizens or require them to buy them? Either way we should decide now. The Mayor then read a letter from Mobil Chemical Company, June 17, 1969. (Attached) After considerable discussion Alderman Shaffer read a proposed "Regulation for Garbage and Household Refuse Collection" which was discussed at the previous special meeting. (Attached).

Mayor Hamer made the following motion: "That the city purchase the 3 mill bags and give each house a normal six months supply of these bags (package of 40 bags). Future bags to be purchased by the individual household. Top Holders will be made available at City Hall at cost of \$3.75 each to any citizen desiring to purchase one. Seconded Alderman D. E. Mahaffey.

A roll call vote was taken per request of Alderman Preston.

Alderman Shaffer made a motion that the Police Commission be authorized to purchase an Electronic Siren for the Police Vehicle. Seconded Alderman C. J. Sahlmann, Approved.

Alderman B. G. Lee stated that the Board of Firemaster had met Tuesday and that they requested authority from Council to spend about \$400.00 for the purchase of household equipment necessary to provide quarters for the firemen. This is not a budget item.

Alderman Shaffer moved that the above request be approved. Seconded Mayor Hamer. Approved.

Alderman Lee stated that the Playground Commission is trying to complete the petition so that we can move forward towards having the Bond election.

The Clerk-Treasurer asked for permission to purchase a Calculator at a price not to exceed \$557.53 plus S. C. Sales Tax. Mayor Hamer asked this expenditure be approved. Seconded Alderman Sahlmann. Approved.

The Clerk asked for a ruling on paying personnel for a week's vacation when they do not take the time off. Mayor Hamer asked Council to authorize this for just two individuals this year they are Chief J. B. White and Mr. Ezekiel Freeman, Driver Sanitation. Seconded Alderman Mahaffey. Approved.

The Mayor asked all Committee Chairman to review the Rules & Policy as pertaining to Employees of the City of Isle of Palms.

There being no further business the Meeting was adjourned.

This is in reference to your letter dated May 16, 1969, with an attached copy of a resolution passed by your council relative to lowering the speed limits on streets on the Isle of Palms. Your request was referred to our Traffic and Planning Engineer for his consideration.

I am now in receipt of a letter from our Traffic and Planning Engineer, Mr. W. W. Bradley, in which he states that there are many urban streets in the State which do not have sidewalks and are similar to those on the Isle of Palms where 30 MPH speed limit now applies. He states further that he does not believe the Department would be justified in approving the requested 25 MPH speed limit on those streets on the Isle of Palms.

SECTION 46-361 of the "S. C. HIGHWAY AND MOTOR VEHICLE LAWS," sets the maximum speed limits on streets in urban areas at 30 MPH unless a special hazard exists. This statute does not require the posting of 30 MPH speed limit signs on streets in urban areas in order for it to be enforced. It is suggested that you contact the local Law Enforcement Agencies and request that they assist you in enforcing this speed limit.

I regret that we are unable to comply with your request in this matter.

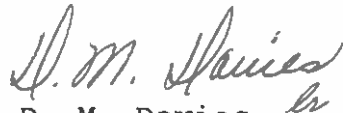

I am enclosing a copy of a letter received this date from the Governor's Office which deals with estimating fund requirements for fiscal year 1971 under the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968. I am also including a copy of a form provided by the Bureau of the Budget to be used in making these estimates. Please note there is a deadline of June 25 by which time we must submit these estimates to the Governor's Office; therefore, we are asking that you please fill out the attached form and return to this office as soon as possible so that we may meet this deadline.

The following information is provided for the information of those who have not had an opportunity to become familiar with this program:

The program is intended to up-grade law enforcement and correctional activities through the use of grants in aid to local communities through the Governor's Committee on Criminal Administration and Juvenile Delinquency. These grants may be made to help in the construction of police and court facilities, up-grading personnel through additional training, recruitment and salary increases, crime prevention through public education, law enforcement planning and other activities.

I realize that it will be difficult in this short period of time to come up with a realistic estimate of any needs that you have under this program; however, please note in the second paragraph of the letter from the Governor's Office that they have requested "a most optimistic estimate of Federal fund requirements". Any information that you are able to provide us will be most helpful.

The Regional Planning Commission has just recently been contacted concerning the development of a law enforcement plan

SUBJECT: Revenue Increase for Municipalities

The largest increase in state-shared revenue to municipalities in the history of your Association is included in The General Appropriation Bill, adopted in its final form Thursday by the General Assembly.

Although the increase is far short of what we originally requested, we are grateful to The Legislature for this increase to benefit all of the cities and towns in this state.

We are also grateful to the municipal officials throughout the state who assisted in getting this aid from their legislators.

The increase to municipalities from state-shared beer and wine taxes amounts to more than a million-and-a-half dollars annually, or approximately a 70 per cent increase in this revenue source.

Part of the increase will become effective July 1 of this year, but the largest part of it will take effect July 1, 1970.

Here is the breakdown:

- I. - Beginning July 1, 1969, beer taxes are increased by 20 per cent. This will result in an increase of approximately \$361,900 to cities and towns this year, or an approximate 20 per cent increase to your city or town this year.

PLEASE NOTE that if The Supreme Court upholds the recent successful incorporation vote in North Charleston, this year's increase would be decreased somewhat, since the new City of North Charleston would have about 94,000 residents, and would share in this revenue.

- II. - Beginning July 1, 1970, municipalities' share of the beer and wine taxes will be increased from 12 per cent to 18 per cent, a 50 per cent increase.

This will result in another annual increase in the approximate amount of \$1,205,450.

Thus over the two-year period, the total increase voted this year amounts to approximately \$1,567,350 a year in the permanent statutes.

Actually, if beer consumption continues to increase as rapidly in the future as it has in the recent past, these figures will be considerably higher. But these are the best estimates available at this time.

We suggest that you thank your legislators for this increase. Although it is far short of what we originally requested from the Ways and Means Committee, it will be a help.

And of course a "thank you" for what they have done for us this year will make The Legislature more receptive to our needs in the future.

The Legislature is expected to adjourn in early July.

A full digest of statewide and local acts affecting and of interest to municipalities will be published by this office as soon as possible after adjournment.

BUDGET PICTURE FOR 1969

INCOME:

So far this year collections in most budget items have been above the halfway mark. Receipt of Real Property tax notices were received twenty-five days earlier this year than 1968. This accounts for this high figure. Business license collection has been good due to other than Laco Construction doing work. Outside builders bring in more sub-contractors. Traffic Fines down but we should pick up the most of this in other areas. Beer, Wine & Liquor tax income will exceed the budget by quite a sum. Public Utilities is complete and it exceeded budget considerably. Next year we should show a marked increase in this with the Sewage system being added.

EXPENSES:

General Government

The budget established for this department appears to adequate. We will exceed the authorization on auditing and new office furniture. However, there should be money in other categories that will keep this department well within its budget. The large over allocation for insurance will be corrected either in August or September. All excess monies for this category will be pro-rated to different departments.

RECORDER

Should be within budget.

PUBLIC WORKS - Street Lights

Should be within budget.

BEACH PATROL

Will exceed budget by a small sum.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

It is anticipated that the Police Department will exceed their budget by a small amount. There are adjustments to be made either in August or September which will aid them in their budget picture.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

It is very possible that these will be a small sum left over in this budget. However, if we add permanent firemen and have to sign up with the S. C. State Retirement Fund Program, this could have a marked effect on all payroll allocations. In this system the city and the employee participate.

BUILDING INSPECTOR

Should stay within budget.

SANITATION

The salary and wage budget will be exceeded by in excess of \$1500.00 at the rate operated during the first six months of the year. They will exceed their budget by about \$3000.00 for the year.

PLAYGROUND

If it were not for the payment on building being included in this, I would say they will exceed their budget by a good margin. The work being done by Mr. Kirby was not budgeted and from what we paid for the city hall work it will be a small sum.

SUMMARY

As of June 30, 1969 we have spent approximately \$50,215.12 on the budget and non budget items. This does not include the \$15,000.00 plus we spent on City Hall. We have to operate through July and August which are high expense months. We have some expenditures that will be coming due shortly. They are: Office Furniture \$2000 plus. Codifying Ordinances - balance due \$800.00. Workmen's Compensation insurance \$1100 plus. As I was instructed at the beginning of the year the fleet insurance policy for nine months will be due September 1, and that will run about \$1900.00.

With these known expenditures and no doubt there will be unforeseen ones that come up. It is very difficult to say that we will stay within the \$110,000. budget as set down at the beginning of the year. I hope by the end of the third quarter to be able to give a better picture on what might be left over at the end of the year.

RULES & POLICIES AS PERTAINS TO EMPLOYEES OF THE CITY OF ISLE OF PALMS

The following positions are established as paid employees of the City. This list can be increased only with the approval of Council. Increases or decreases in salary can only be made with the approval of council.

Emergency hiring maybe accomplished for a period of five working days if approved by the Mayor.

- City Secretary
- Chief of Police

- Playground Director
- Assistant Director (part time)
- Sanitation Superintendent

- Lifeguard (summer only)
- Lifeguard (summer only)
- Fireman
- Fireman
- Fireman

SALARIES:

Council will set the salaries of each employee or position for the ensuing year at the December meeting. Should Council fail to set the salaries at the December meeting, the salary rate paid during December will continue enforce until changed by council. Increases, bonuses or other payments must be approved by council prior to payment.

VACATIONS:

To be eligible for a vacation during any calendar year an employee must have been, or will have been, a full time employee of the City for an unbroken period of twelve months as of the first day of April. The vacation week, will consist of five working days.

- Each full time employee working for the city one year - one week.
- Each employee employed for two years but less than ten years - two weeks.
- Each employee employed ten or more years - three weeks.

Monetary compensation in lieu of vacation time can be accomplished only if approved by council. Compensation will be based on a 40 hour week and no employee maybe compensated for more than one week in any twelve month period.

SICK LEAVE:

An employee maybe compensated for time actually off the job due to illness if a statement is obtained from a competent physician. The amount of sick time for compensation will not exceed four working days during any twelve month period. Time missed from work in excess of four working days will be without pay unless vacation time is used.

WORK TIME:

Each section employing full time personnel will establish the work periods for their employees and furnish the Treasurer a copy for his files.

INDIVIDUALS paid on monthly or semi-monthly basis will not be eligible for over-time payment without prior approval of council.

INDIVIDUALS paid by the week will be compensated on an hourly rate. This rate will be established by council for each position.

The normal work week will be Monday thru Friday.

The normal working hours will be from 8 AM to 12 Noon - 1 PM to 5 PM.

Variances of this schedule maybe made at the discretion of Committee Chairman. However, no overtime will be authorized until an individual has worked 40 hours, during the pay period. It is the Policy of the city to grant one hour for lunch each day.

OVERTIME:

In excess of twelve hours for any one week must be approved by either the Mayor or Council prior to the end of the pay period.

SPECIAL COUNCIL MEETING JUNE 18, 1969

The great majority of those participating in this project were in favor of continued use of the bags.

Mr. Capper then passed out an estimated saving breakdown titled "Estimated yearly savings to City with use of bags".

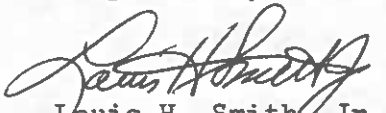
There was considerable discussion on the pilot project and just how the savings would be accomplished.

Total cost of bags and stands on proposed # 2, \$8,538.00. Seconded Alderman Mahaffey.

After discussion, a vote was taken; Results: For the Motion Two, not in favor of the Motion, Three. Motion not carried.

For the present, pick-up of this material will be accomplished on Monday, Wednesday, and Fridays. If for some unforeseen reason this is not completed on these days it will be finished the day following.

Other trash such as coming from yard rakings, large boxes, large cans, etc: will be gathered on Tuesdays and Thursdays. This material must be placed as close to the street as practical so that the gathering trucks are able to stop close by it.

Dear Residents of Forest Trails:

We are sorry to let you know that City Council could not approve the polyethylene bag system of garbage disposal and pick-up at this time due to the initial outlay of money.

For your information, the great majority of you folks favored this system even with the annoyance of the dog and raccoon problem. This problem was realized from the beginning of the trial but is not considered an insurmountable one. In fact there are presently being developed protective measures for the bags at small cost.

During the course of this trial it was found that your area could be serviced in less than one-half the time and the work was certainly much easier for the men involved. In fact the savings that could be gained by using this system would practically keep all homes supplied with bags. And regardless of the several methods possible a program of this nature is considered by many as most progressive and the means to combat a number of growing problems connected with this necessary city service. Perhaps ways of using this system can be found in the future.

Regretfully, it will now be necessary to either pick up the holders and stands or you may purchase them at a one-half cost price. The two parts complete would cost the city \$7.00 so that anyone wishing to keep theirs could buy it for \$3.50.

We'd like to take this opportunity to thank each of you for your cooperation and assistance in this trial period and in particular your neighbor ladies Mrs. MacDonald, Mrs. Avant, and Mrs. Petit who actually did most of the work.

Beginning April 21, 1969, your city in conjunction with Mobil Chemical Company, will test a revolutionary method of collecting and disposal of garbage. We would like to ask your help and cooperation in this six week test. After this period we would appreciate your comments whether they be favorable or unfavorable.

There are many reasons for testing and perhaps eventual adoption of a disposable garbage bag system. To you, the residents, the advantage of a sanitary, noise free, and odor free method of garbage removal should be an appealing alternative to what is many times the unsanitary and disagreeable task of using a garbage can which must periodically be cleaned and soon replaced. The sturdy polyethylene bag will eliminate can washing and littering around the area where contents are transferred from one can to another or where cans are emptied into truck.

An Act To Authorize Law Enforcement Officers Of The City Of Isle Of Palms, The City Of Mount Pleasant And The Township Of Sullivan's Island, In Charleston County, To Extend Mutual Assistance To Each Other's Law Enforcement Officers.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina :

SECTION 1. The governing bodies of the City of Isle of Palms, the City of Mount Pleasant and the Township of Sullivan's Island, in Charleston County, or the mayor of either of such cities or the chairman of the commission of the township may, upon request of the governing body, chairman or mayor of either city or township, send any law enforcement officers temporarily to assist the law enforcement officers of such requesting city or township in the performance of their duties. Any such assisting law enforcement officers shall have the same authority to make arrests and to execute criminal process as is vested by law in the law enforcement officers of the requesting city or township.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon approval by the Governor.

Beginning September 15, 1969 all garbage and household refuse must be contained in a polyethylene bag of a minimum thickness of three mills. This standard is necessary because of the distance many bags will have to be carried and the handling they will receive.

This bag must be secured or tied on top with a suitable wire or string so that it will not become undone when bag is handled. It must be ready to "go" when the sanitation worker arrives for pick-up. Bags must also be located so that they are readily accessible to the sanitation worker in order that the least possible time is involved in their pick-up. Bags must be placed outside of fences where dogs are enclosed.

If protection of bags from predatory animals is necessary it shall be the resident's responsibility to see that this is taken care of.

Twice a week pick-up of garbage will be instituted at this time. From Breach Inlet to 27th Street will be accomplished on Mondays and Thursdays. From 27th to the other end of our City will be taken care of on Tuesdays and Fridays. If for some unforeseen reason pick-up is not finished on these days it will be completed the day following.

Trash such as coming from yard rakings, large boxes, large cans, etc: will be gathered on Wednesdays and each afternoon to the extent possible. Trash must be placed as close to the street as practical so that the gathering trucks are able to stop close by it. It would be most helpful if this material was in containers or the large plastic trash bags that are available at most stores.

Disposal of material from the clearing of vacant lots and that from any construction shall be taken care of by the party responsible for doing the work.

TO THE RESIDENTS OF ISLE OF PALMS:

Beginning September 15, 1969 your City will begin a new system of garbage handling and pick-up with the use of polyethylene bags.

There are many reasons for adopting this system which has been under trial and study in our Forest Trails area. Several of these are the cleanliness and neatness of the containers, the upgrading of the work of the sanitation worker, and the speed of pick-up with the resulting reduction of work force and equipment.

In order to begin this program the City will furnish each household an initial supply of 40 bags. At the calculated rate of two bags per week these 40 bags should last until about the middle of next January. There will be additional bags available at City Hall for twelve cents each.

These bags require a special holder which can be mounted most anywhere one wants to locate their new "garbage can". They can be mounted on a post or tree in your back yard, they can be attached anywhere in your car port or in your garage, or with an accessory stand they can be located on back porches or even in the kitchen. These holders will be available at City Hall at a quantity price of \$ 3.75. When it is considered that this holder would cost very little more than a top grade garbage can and would last many years more this cost is small when considering the advantages gained.

Orders for the holders will be taken at City Hall during the month of August with delivery of them before September 15. The accessory stand can also be ordered at City Hall at the cost price of \$ 3.75.

" Retirement Day " for your old, nasty, beat up garbage can is approaching. The residents of Forest Trails have given overwhelming endorsement to this system and it is believed that our whole community will feel the same way once it is given a fair trial. Please be assured that your full cooperation will be appreciated.

REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING SEPTEMBER 10, 1969

The regular meeting of the Isle of Palms City Council was held in the Council Chambers of City Hall this day convening at 8 P.M. EDT.

The meeting was opened with a Prayer by the Honorable Joseph H. Hamer, Mayor.

Members in attendance were Mayor Joseph H. Hamer, Aldermen Max V. Capper, B. G. Lee, D. E. Mahaffey, Stuart Preston, C. J. Sahlmann and L. C. Cable.

Members not attending were Aldermen W. L. Shaffer and J. E. Boswell.

Mayor Hamer read a letter from Clyde Dangerfield to Mr. Wiggins in regard to litterbug stations being painted. Copy attached.

The Mayor also read a letter from Henry Schachte and Son concerning bond for special deputy badges. Copy attached.

Mr. and Mrs. David Johnson were welcomed to the meeting as visitors.

Alderman Capper amended a statement from the August minutes concerning a statement that his time was too valuable to continue with this particular project. He qualified this statement by saying that he was resigning as Chairman of the Sanitation Committee.

Alderman Lee reported that the goal for the petition on the playground building had almost been reached. He stated that he hoped to have a full-time fireman on duty by October 15. A stove has been installed and other furniture is either already installed or available. Five applications have been received as a result of a newspaper advertisement, two of which look very interesting. He will request the State Fire Underwriters to reduce our fire insurance as of January 1, 1970.

Alderman Preston asked if further information had been received on codification of ordinances to which the Mayor replied that the lawyer was still following up on this matter.

Alderman Cable inquired as to whether S. C. Electric and Gas had been heard from regarding the application for street lights. The Clerk will follow up on this subject.

No report was given by Alderman Mahaffey.

Alderman Capper referred to a letter he had written to Mayor Hamer last month and asked that a copy of this letter be attached to the minutes. Mayor Hamer read the letter containing Alderman Capper's resignation as Chairman of the Sanitation Committee and his reasons for taking this action. The letter was declared to be official and was accepted by Mayor Hamer. Alderman Capper stated that he felt it is essential for a project to be worked out but whatever is decided must exclude him.

Mayor Hamer asked Mr. and Mrs. Johnson if they had anything they would like to say. They expressed interest in what is going on in the City. Mrs. Johnson

remarked on the rapid growth of the Island and asked if anyone had thought about putting aside a parcel of unspoiled property to be used as a park.

Mayor Hamer stated in his financial report that we should have between \$18,000.00 and \$20,000.00 at the end of the year.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

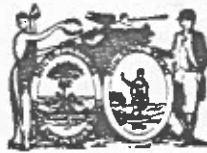

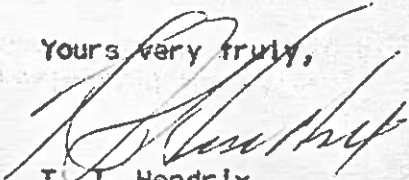
This letter refers to the beach erosion and shoreline recession which continues to occur along the shoreline of the Isle of Palms between 42nd Avenue and 46th Avenue.

The Department's contemplated plans for dealing with this problem make provision for the installation of a beach groin perpendicular to the shoreline within the right-of-way of 46th Avenue and perhaps one or two additional groins. This planning must necessarily include some additional work on the masonry revetment which was installed by the Citadel and by the adjacent property owner, Mr. Baylis Anderson. With regard to the latter work, it is believed that the elevation of the top of this revetment section should be raised so as to conform with the elevation of the segment northeast of it. Some of the larger voids in it should be reduced by using smaller rip-rap stone; and further, the entire revetment, both the shoreline surface and the exposed or outside surface should be sealed so as to prevent the passage of water through the structure with the resulting effect of the sand backfill on the shoreline side being carried through it. It is believed that this sealing can be effectively done by using a hot plant mix of sand asphalt. Following the placing of the sand asphalt material, backfilling would be done by placing sufficient material so that the top surface of the backfill would have a width of two feet and would have a backslope of $1\frac{1}{2}:1$. If you are agreeable to the proposed revetment work, the Department will proceed accordingly with these plans and with the understanding that the cost of all work involved will be borne by the Department.

I shall appreciate your advising of your concurrence in this proposed work by and at the expense of the Department on the existing revetment along Citadel property.

Special Notice Memorandum

TO: All Commission Members, Heads of Local Government and Other Interested Parties

FROM: C. Michael Pugh, Director

SUBJECT: Applicants to Become Ineligible for Water and Sewer Grants Under The Department of Housing and Urban Development's Water and Sewer Facilities Program After September 30, 1969.

DATE: August 27, 1969

1. Notice has been received from the Department of Housing and Urban Development that the deadline for the completion of the Long Range Planning requirements for the Department of Housing and Urban Development's Basic Water and Sewer Facilities Program will positively be October 1, 1969, with no prospect for an extension of this deadline.

2. This means that after September 30, 1969 all applicants or prospective applicants for assistance from the Department of Housing and Urban Development for Basic Water and Sewer Facilities in Charleston and Berkeley Counties will become ineligible to receive grants under this program unless the Long Range planning requirements are met. (Prior to this deadline, applicants can qualify for eligibility if the planning requirements are under preparation.)

3. The Department of Housing and Urban Development is now initiating a certification procedure for notifying Areawide Planning Organizations - (such as the Berkeley-Charleston Regional Planning Commission) when they have fulfilled the Department of Housing and Urban Development's planning requirements. This procedure involves three separate certifications as follows:

I Institutional Certification

The Department of Housing and Urban Development will formally recognize a specific planning organization (such as the Berkeley-Charleston Regional Planning Commission) for each urban area that desires to receive assistance for water and sewer facilities through the Department of Housing and Urban Development - This certification will be valid for a two (2) year period.

II Comprehensive Planning Certification

After gaining recognition as specified in I above, we will need to complete the following three comprehensive planning

actions:

- (1) formally adopt a Work Program covering not less than 12 months.
- (2) formally adopt a Statement of Areawide Goals and Objectives.
- (3) develop and adopt an Areawide Land Use Element of the comprehensive plan for our planning jurisdiction.

III Water and Sewer Functional Planning Certification

Also, after gaining the formal recognition specified in I above, we will need to complete the following two functional planning actions:

- (1) formally adopt an areawide water and sewer element of the comprehensive plan that is consistent with previously agreed upon goals, objectives and land use policies.
- (2) formally adopt a 5 to 10 year water and sewer development program that is consistent with the water and sewer element -- This certification will be valid for a 12 months period.

4. The Berkeley-Charleston Regional Planning Commission is a relatively young organization, having been in existence for only a little over one year; however, no exception to the Department of Housing and Urban Development's deadline for new organizations is indicated. Needless to say, the Regional Planning Commissions staff is hard at work in an attempt to meet the involved requirements set forth above for obtaining the Department of Housing and Urban Development's three certifications in order to again qualify applicants in Berkeley and Charleston Counties (after 30 September 1969) for grants under the Department of Housing and Urban Development's Water and Sewer Facilities Program. In spite of this however, there will inevitably occur quite a delay between the October 1, 1969 deadline and the date of the Commission's achieving certification.

5. Until the deadline of 1 October 1969, applicants in Berkeley and Charleston Counties qualify for eligibility by virtue of the fact that the Department of Housing and Urban Development's planning requirements are "under preparation by the Commission." Therefore, any applicant or prospective applicant in the Berkeley-Charleston Counties Region (whether a member of the Planning Commission or not) who is contemplating making an application to the Department of Housing and Urban Development for a water and sewer grant under the Department of Housing and Urban Development's

Water and Sewer Facilities Program, is urged to submit his application to the Berkeley-Charleston Regional Planning Commission for Section 204 Review action as soon as possible, so that it can be reviewed and endorsed and then be received by the Department of Housing and Urban Development prior to the 1 October 1969 deadline. If you miss this deadline, a delay of a year or more could occur before the Regional Planning Commission is able to achieve the Department of Housing and Urban Development's three certifications and again qualify applicants in our region.

I have already mentioned to you that it is time I be replaced on your Sanitation Committee. I urge you to do this immediately as there are critical times ahead in this area of city work.

Joe, I've always thought that I possessed more than the average amount of tenacity so I'm not in the least bit bothered by the thought of "quitting". You see, when uncontrollable personal resentment from others smothers your effectiveness, it is time.

You know and understand my sentiments for thinking this way but for the record I'd like to mention a couple of things.

To have several months of hard work and study scuttled by personal feelings and without the slightest bit of objectivity is intolerable. If there had been constructive criticisms available they must have been withheld purposefully as none were offered from outside of committee. In any operation someone has to work out the details. Certainly the rest of our committee and yourself were kept informed of plan and progress.

As for pricing, timing, and the other aspects of our program there were definite and sound reasons for working it out the way it was. Even the twelve cent price on bags was not entirely without thought as it was a means of recuperating the fringe costs in the whole program. I believe anyone with an open mind would not argue against this. Even during the two week period between the time our letters went out and our last meeting there was no thought expressed from the boys except for a casual mention of the twelve cents.

The net result is only a lot of bad publicity for the City and the making of everyone, not only myself, to look like a bunch of dunces. This must have been the purpose for the action.

Joe, I again urge you to act immediately.

Garbage Rules Won't Be Changed

The Isle of Palms City Council, after a heated debate Wednesday night, reversed by a 5-2 vote a decision made last month concerning new changes in garbage collection that were slated to take effect Sept. 15.

Alderman Max V. Capper, calling the defeat a "big disappointment," offered his resignation as chairman of the island's Sanitation Committee.

Residents of Isle of Palms received notices from the Mayor's office and from the Island's Sanitation Department last month stating that "beginning Sept. 15, all garbage and household refuse must be contained in a polyethylene bag instead of garbage cans and other containers."

The council voted in its regular meeting last month to appropriate funds for purchase of an initial supply of bags that would be distributed to households.

The notices sent the residents stirred up a lot of opposition and four residents met with council Wednesday to voice their protest. Some council members also said they had discovered loopholes in the proposed system.

One Isle of Palms resident, David Johnson, told council was misled by the notices.

"We were told we had to change over to the system when the ordinance was not law yet," Johnson explained.

Mayor Joseph H. Hamer said "the ordinance has not been passed yet but the money was appropriated for purchase of the bags in anticipation of the ordinance being made law."

Mrs. Walter L. Shaffer, wife of an Isle of Palms alderman, told council she "resented the fact" that residents would be required to purchase the bags after an initial supply was exhausted.

However, the strongest protest to the proposed garbage collection system was voiced by Alderman Stuart Preston who said "the whole story has not been given to the public."

Preston said the bags would cost the city 8.9 cents each. But after an initial supply of bags was exhausted, the resident could buy the bags from City Hall for 12 cents each.

"The city is going into the retail business with a neat 25 per cent profit assured on the sale of each bag."

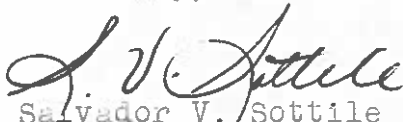

Several days ago, each household in our city received two letters. One was on the city's letterhead and signed by the Mayor. The other was signed "Sanitation Committee". Whether these letters were sent out prematurely is a question which I do not intend to go in to at this time. The letters are now public record and raise questions which must be answered. I learned from these letters that as of September 15, I must bag my garbage in order for it to be picked up and that the bags are going to cost me twelve cents each. The best, and in fact the only information given to Council indicated that these bags will cost the city 8.9 cents each. The only conclusion that can be drawn from this is that the city is going into the retail business with a neat 25% profit assured on the sale of each bag.

The next bit of information which I learned is that these bags require a special holder. In the motion passed by this Council on July 9, it is clearly stated that these holders would be made available to any citizen desiring to purchase one. It was certainly not the intent of Council to require this equipment as these letters lead the public to believe.

There are other questions that should be asked, but for now let's move on to a newspaper article which appeared on the second front of the News and Courier on August 4. It repeats much of the material handed out in the letters; however, one paragraph stands out and I quote: "The system was inovated by Mobil Chemical Company. The Company claims the new system is more sanitary, cheaper and requires less man hours to operate

than the present system of garbage collection used on the Island."

Gentlemen, this will forever more have to remain a claim since we have proved it is not a fact. If the system is cheaper than the present system, we would be able to collect the same amount of garbage for less money. It certainly would not be necessary to pass the additional high cost of operation directly on to the residents of our city.

In this same article, I again quote: "Isle of Palms City officials say the new system will not cause any significant increase in the city's budget." I certainly agree with this statement since the increase as proposed will be in the resident's budget--not the city's.

Still quoting from the same article of August 4: "One official claimed the new system should keep the rising cost of garbage collection down during the next few years." Mercifully, this official was not named because I have talked to many residents on the Island who would like to ask him how you keep costs down by raising them.

I feel that the points I have mentioned are very important; however, there is one basic question which has not been discussed and that question is what this action is really going to mean in terms of money.

To arrive at a realistic figure, I have determined from the audit report, City of Isle of Palms, December 31, 1968, that one mill brings the city an income of approximately \$1,300.

Accepting a figure of two bags per week (or 104 per year), which allows for no loss at all and is a low figure, the average household will spend a minimum of \$12.48 per year on garbage bags.

Now, since several figures are available on the number of households on the Island that will be forced to use this system, let's take a low number -- 1000 families. One thousand families multiplied by \$12.48 yields a gross income of \$12,480 from the sale of bags. Since one mill is worth approximately \$1,300 to the city, you arrive at a "tax increase" of about nine mills. Since the program is not to be financed by a tax increase, but rather by requiring the citizen to buy his own equipment, we have prevented the deduction of this "tax" from his Federal Income Tax and raised his cost just a little more.

Now, please don't misunderstand me. I am not advocating a tax increase. The purpose of all of this is to show that a program presented to us as an economy is in reality an excessively expensive method of attacking the problem.

I submit to this Council that the whole story has not been given to the public. I do not imply that information has been deliberately withheld, but I do say that this plan has not been explained in sufficient detail to allow the public to arrive at an informed opinion. Indeed, it has been presented as a program already in effect thus discouraging opposition.

I believe I have presented enough facts and raised enough questions to give good and sufficient reason for asking that this action be referred back to Committee for further study and comparison with other more economical solutions to the garbage collection problem.

I, therefore, ask this Council to reverse its vote of July 9, 1969 on a motion concerning the purchase and distribution of plastic garbage bags.

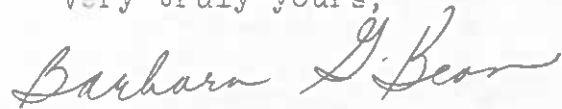

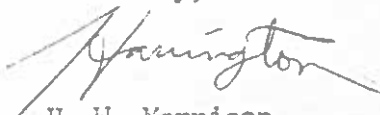

Dear Mayor Hamer:

As you may be aware, Governor McNair has appointed an Advisory Committee on Housing to study means by which the State of South Carolina may become more directly involved in solving the housing problems confronting our citizens today. This committee, broadly representative of those concerned with housing problems and the housing industry, has already held its first meeting and is collecting data which we hope to use in developing a preliminary approach to the problem. In addition, the Office of the Governor, through the State Planning and Grants Division, has held a preliminary meeting with the Atlanta Regional Office of the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to discuss the role which the State of South Carolina will play in taking advantage of Federal funds now available to States.

I am writing you to acquaint you with the activities of the Advisory Committee of which I am Chairman, and also to inform you that Mr. Dick Anderson from HUD (FHA, Atlanta) has been loaned to the State to serve as coordinator of our housing program. Although we are still in the preliminary stages of our study leading to a comprehensive program, Mr. Anderson is available at the present time to consult with you regarding housing opportunities and to advise you as to means by which you may take advantage of them. He may be reached through the Division of Planning and Grants, Office of the Governor, Columbia.

Because your municipality does not have urban renewal or a workable housing program at the present time, the availability of resources through these programs will be limited. I do urge you, however, to take advantage of the services we can now extend to you and to explore means by which we may help you to plan future programs.

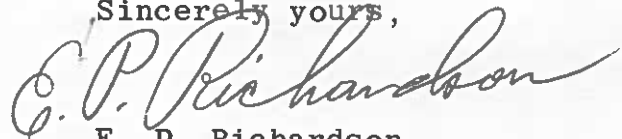

The regular meeting of the Isle of Palms City Council was held in the Council Chambers of City Hall this day convening at 8 P.M. EDT.

The meeting was opened with a Prayer by the Honorable Joseph H. Hamer, Mayor.

Members in attendance were Mayor Joseph H. Hamer, Aldermen Max V. Capper, B. G. Lee, Stuart Preston, L. C. Cable, and Walter L. Shaffer, Jr.

Members not attending were Aldermen D. E. Mahaffey, J. E. Boswell, and C.J. Sahlmann.

Mayor Hamer read the following correspondence:

1. A copy of a letter from Clyde Dangerfield to Supt. D. K. Brasington concerning litter around Moultrie Schools.
2. A copy of a letter from Clyde Dangerfield to Mr. L. E. Wiggins concerning slick pavement on Highway 703.
3. A copy of a letter from T. J. Hendrix, State Highway Engineer, to General Hugh P. Harris in reference to beach erosion control.
4. A copy of a letter from Paul C. Masschelin of West Virginia Pulp and Paper Co. to E. D. Cable concerning the trial of Papercan bags.
5. A letter from Attorney General Daniel R. McLeod concerning Sections 47-57, Code of Laws of 1962.
6. A letter to Mr. Edwin Guenther, Chm., County Board of Registration, advising him of Mrs. B.C. Rivers appointment to Chairman of the Election Committee.
