BY THE SECRETARY OF STATE.

Whereas, Fifty freehold voters of the proposed town of ISLE OF PALMS

did, on the 31st. day of May 1952, ~~1953~~, file with the Secretary of State a written petition, signed by themselves, setting forth:

FIRST: That they were citizens and freeholders and electors of the proposed town.

SECOND: The name of the proposed town to be ISLE OF PALMS

THIRD: The incorporate limits of the town to be AS SHOWN BY PETITION

FOURTH: That they desired to be incorporated. In perpetuity.

AND WHEREAS, On the 12th. day of January, 1953, the said

J. R. DEANS, MRS. JOHN B. HARTNETT, AND THOMAS F. KNIGHT

who were commissioned by

me did file with the Secretary of State their return in writing, over their signatures, certifying the result of said election, with the managers return attached, in favor of corporation, the name of the town, and that WALTER I. CHAPMAN, JR. was elected Mayor, and Herbert T. Lauden, W. E. McKamey, J. Leonard Cameron, L. Rhame, Nelson, Richard J. Schneider, Jr., Salvador V. Sottile, Norman W. Todd and James Allan were elected Wardens.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, O. Frank Thornton, Secretary of State, by virtue of the authority in me vested by an Act of the General Assembly, entitled "An Act to Provide for the Incorporation of Towns of Not Less Than One Thousand, Nor More Than Five Thousand, Inhabitants," approved the fifth day of March, A. D. 1896, do hereby issue to the Mayor and Aldermen elect this Certificate of Incorporation of the town of ISLE OF PALMS, with the powers, privileges and immunities, and subject to the limitations prescribed in the said Act.
